Information Technology News and Updates

- New E-mail Program Limits Attachment Size.** A question has been raised about the attachment size issue with the upcoming email migration, specifically whether the size restriction applies to both sent email as well as received email. Yes, the size restriction applies to both sent and received email, so an effort needs to be made to go through all your email and remove attachments larger than 25 MB. If you need to keep the body of the email with the attachment, I suggest creating a folder for the attachment, then copy/paste the body of the email into either a text document or a Word document, so you can keep contextual information with the attachment (notes, installation instructions, etc.). I will try to start departmental email migration within the next three to four weeks, so please try to have your mail files prepped before then.
- Phishing Season Continues.** Using multiple lures and sender addresses, phishing emails continue to target UNL. Please continue to report and do not respond to these phony emails. Our security and systems personnel continue to close the door on each of these attempts. Have you got one? Forward it to mysupport@unl.edu. Compare it with the list at <http://is.unl.edu/phishing>. HAPPI was informed that effective March 1 the Travel Addendum will no longer be accepted for domestic travel. Detailed receipts will be required for all expenses \$5 or greater. This means if you do not have an itemized receipt for your meal, you will not be reimbursed for those expenses. You may continue to use the Travel Addendum for International Travel where no detailed receipts can be acquired.
