Additionally, she has held an administrative internship as Faculty Associate to the Chancellor (to former UNL Chancellor Graham Spanier), served as Vice Chair in Curriculum and Instruction, and served as Chair of the Graduate Program in Curriculum and Instruction.

Dr. Aguilar's areas of expertise include academic program coordination and progressive administrative responsibilities with strong emphasis on diversity, multicultural and cross-cultural education, and inclusiveness. Between 1982 and 2000, she held faculty positions in both undergraduate and graduate education at the University of New Mexico, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and Arizona State University in the academic fields of leisure studies, therapeutic recreation, ethnic studies, and multicultural education. She has extensive experience mentoring and advising masters and doctoral students, including co-authoring publications and co-presenting at national and international meetings. She is involved in professional development activities and as an outreach consultant in higher education institutions, community-based agencies, and public school systems.

Dr. Aguilar's scholarly interests include: teacher education/multicultural education, measurements on diversity (e.g. beliefs and knowledge about diversity, and ethnic leisure), and understanding race and ethnicity. She participated in the 2002 Bryn Mawr Summer Institute for Women in Higher Education. Aguilar is a member of the Consortium for American Indian Graduate Education, AAUW, AERA, NACCS, NAME, and Phi Beta Delta. She also serves as a Member of the Board of Directors of the Western Association of Graduate Schools.

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
