DEDICATION

This year as on several other occasions in the past, the members of The Nebraska Chapter of the National Block and Bridle Club dedicate the yearbook to two individuals. They are Professor William J. Loeffel, former head of the Animal Husbandry Department at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, and Mr. Parr Young of Saranville, Nebraska, a pioneer cattle feeder in southeast Nebraska.

WILLIAM J. LOEFFEL

On May 5, 1962, with the death of Professor William J. Loeffel, the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture lost a man who had served it for 43 years. In 21 of these years he was the head of the Department of Animal Husbandry where he received national and international recognition for his contributions to meats research, teaching, and administration. In 1959 he retired as department head and since then until his death he continued to serve the college as professor of Animal Husbandry.

He had served as superintendent of the Ak-Sar-Ben Livestock
Show and was a member of the Board of Governors of the American
Royal Livestock Show in Kansas City. He also worked with the
National Research Council, the Feed Industry Council, National
Meat Review Committee, the American Society of Animal Production,
the U.S.D.A. and a great many more agricultural societies.

Professor Loeffels mark is indelibly imprinted in Nebraska and American agriculture. He was one to whom agriculture in general and especially that of Nebraska's livestock industry owes a great debt of gratitude. It is with warm memory and gracious thanks that the Nebraska Chapter of the National Block and Bridle Club for the second time dedicates a year book to our former honorary, friend of all, and one of Nebraska's foremost educators in the field of Agricultural Science.

PARR YOUNG

Mr. Parr Young is without any doubt one of the foremost leaders in feeding of cattle and swine in the state of Nebraska. As a little boy Mr. Young was given two calves with the understanding that if he would take good care of both he could keep one. He took care of the calves and from that time until his retirement in 1955 cattle feeding has been his life.

Mr. Young was the founder and first president of the Cass
County Feeders Association and was instrumental in organizing the
Nebraska Feeders Association which he served as its second president. He was one of the founders of the Nebraska Livestock
Feeders and Breeders Association. He also has served on the Nebraska Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

In his community, Parr has been a trustee in the Murray United
Presbyterian Church, chairman of the County Fair Bureau and completed terms on the county fair board and a Cass County Commissioner.

Although Mr. Young retired from the cattle feeder business in 1955, he still lives close to the place where he fed out many thousands of hogs and beef animals.



PUREBRED EWE SALE

The University of Nebraska held a purebred ewe sale at the animal Husbandry Pavilion on the Agricultural Campus on December 9, 1961. At this sale purebred sheep breeders from throughout the state consign their bred ewes.

The Block and Bridle Club members set up the necessary equipment and assist with getting sheep to and from the sale ring.

They also serve as ringmen and assist the clerk. This year there were Hampshire, Shropshire, Southdown, Corriedale, Suffolk, Cheviot, and Dorset breeds represented in the sale.

The Block and Bridle Club received \$40 for their assistance with the sale.

HOLIDAY HAM SALE

The Block and Bridle Club held a Holiday Ham Sale again this year to raise money to be used for our tour in the spring. The hams were purchased from Geo. A. Hormel Company of Fremont, Nebraska. The club sold 6,280 lbs. of ham and made a profit of \$700.51 on the project.

The jackets are purchased by club members and the lettering is paid for by the club. These jackets have been used here for a number of years and are a very familiar sight on the Ag College Campus.



BLOCK & BRIDLE CLUB TOUR

The members of the University of Nebraska Block and Bridle Club decided to take a tour on April 25, 26, 27, and 28. Twenty-seven members of the club, eight students from an Animal Husbandry class, our advisor, the Animal Husbandry Department chairman, and the judging coach made the trip along with a photographer from the University of Nebraska Publicity Department.

After leaving Lincoln at 5:00 a.m. we made our first stop at the Oscar Scheer swine operation at Arlington, Nebraska. After a tour through the operation, the bus left for the Morgan Rasmussen feedlot in Herman, Nebraska. Here they explained how they consistantly top the market with high quality cattle. To be able to compare the different type of cattle being fed, the next stop was at the Wyler and Pring feedlots where they were feeding plainer cattle and Holsteins.

The last stop for the morning was with Leon Rathke of Beemer, lebraska where he showed us his registered Landrace hogs and his extensive operation.

After lunch we stopped at Elman Eggers' farm at Tilden where he has quite a large herd of Charolaise cattle. Being able to get first hand information on this type of little seen cattle was very interesting. Our last stop for the day was the Lynn Keith swine feeding operation at Neligh, Nebraska. He showed us through his new farrow house which had heated pipes in the floor. After

this stop we had supper and drove to Bassett, Nebraska -- on the edge of the Nebraska sandhills, where we spent the night.

After an early breakfast, the club toured the Frank Reece ranch. Mr. Reece runs a commercial herd of more than 700 Angus. It was interesting for many of the members to see the operation since Mr. Reece's son, Bud, was a member of the Block and Bridle Glub while he was at the University of Nebraska.

After the Reece ranch, we stopped at the Pybread Hereford ranch and the Fairway ranch both in the Valentine area. Both of these ranches were producing high quality registered Herefords. At the Dybread ranch they are using the 1962 National Western Grand Champion Bull--King Husker 1962. This bull was purchased in Denver for \$32,000.

After a roast beef dinner in Valentine, we drove across Cheny county, Nebraska's largest and stopped at Frank Carver ranch.

Here we inspected his commercial Hereford herd and about fifty head of his registered Quarter Horses of particular interest which was won. Here we were served punch and cookies by the wife of the county extension agent and Mrs. Carver.

The last stop of the day was at Bob Johnson's ranch in Merriman. Ir. Johnson has a large commercial herd of Herefords which are bred by the use of artifical insemination. He is also doing extensive production testing for Armour and Company. Feeding tests are also being run with Aureomycin. To see his herd, the bus that we were traveling in had to travel over 15 miles of sandy trails. The driver was glad that he had a load of men--after

we had pushed the bus out of the sand when it got stuck two times.

After eighteen hours on the road, we spent the night in Chadron, Nebraska.

Friday morning we stopped at the Pilster and Campbell ranch where we saw a sheep operation. We drove across the range to see the main herd. Of paricular interest here was the soil--which we were told had a water permeability of one inch per twenty four hours.

The rest of the morning was spent at the Fort Robinson Beef Cattle Research Station. Here the club saw the experimental breeding herd, the cattle that are in a heterosis experiment, the extensive feeding and reporduction test. It was felt that this was the highlight of the trip. Here we saw how the combined efforts of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Nebraska College of Agriculture are improving the billion dollar cattle industry.

In the afternoon we inspected the Messensmith ranch which is producing purebred and commercial herefords. As a side line the Messersmiths have a herd of registered Arabian horses. Many members were suprised at how small a foal is.

That evening we went through the Brand office and the Cattleman's Association offices in alliance. They explained their function and then provided a delicious beef dinner.

On the fourth and final day of the trip our first stop was

at the ranch of Orvil E. Kuhlman in North Platte. Here we inspected a herd of 100 registered polled Herefords of Gold Mine, Advance Domino and Choice Domino Breeding. The present herd sire Deamond made the Register of Merit this year.

Also in North Platte we visited the ranch of Wes Hansen who runs a purebred and commerical herd. His cattle were of particular interest since the University of Nebraska has purchased Hansen calves for experimental lots for many years.

The third stop that was made in North Platte was the University of Nebraska U.S.D.A. Experiment Station. Here we saw what is being done with crop and animal research. After an interesting lecture we were taken out to the plots to get a first hand view.

After lunch we stopped at Armour and Company feedlots in Cozad.

After looking at the feeding arrangement, we saw about 2,000 calves that are on Armour's Beef Cattle Improvement Research Program. This program hinges on the successful employment of artifical insemination to spread the use of top-notch sires.


The final stop of the trip was at Cornland Dressed Beef Packing Plant. This is a new \$750,000 plant that is owned and operated by local feeders. They figure that by selling carcass instead of cattle they can realize a larger return on their investment.

After touring the plant we boarded the bus and started back to Lincoln.


After more than 90 hours and 1,150 miles we arrived in Linclon a bit tired but with a good deal more knowledge about our vocation--




This is a picture of the entire group that went on the tour. This was taken at the University of Nebraska, North Platte Experiment Station.


Topping the list of Block and Bridle awards was the presentation of the Chapter Merit Trophy to George Ahlschwede as the outstanding club member of the year.

Block and Bridle club members discussed club activities and college work with these visitors from a student's point of view.


QUARTERHORSE SHOW


The show was held on May 11 and 12. More than 250 entries from 9 states were present.
