This is only the second time we have given this award, which is named for the former Dean of our Agricultural Research Division. Animal Science Professor Rodger Johnson received the award last year, the first time it was given.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture tops the list.

Wageningen University in the Netherlands is the number one university.

We rank 10th among universities worldwide, and eighth among U.S. universities.

The University of California-Davis is the top U.S. university cited. We are working – and you are studying and researching – in some very good company here!

I urge you, while with us, to take every opportunity to explore your science, and to question the very fine minds here on all scientific issues of concern to you. Explore the ethics of

science with people who have explored those issues ahead of you, and who are eager to discuss what they have learned. Learn all you can about why we do the work we do at this great land-grant university, and why the national land-grant universities have made such tremendous contributions to science over the years.

Land-grant universities are universities of and for the people – they came into being because of people’s educational needs, and they remain vital today because of their mission to take the resources of the university to various states, through classroom teaching, through research, and through extension education.

As we celebrate your awards today, indeed as we celebrate you and all that you will add to the world’s body of knowledge, we remember with gratitude the people who have made your awards available through their generous gifts to the university.

These are people who believed in the promise of the future, which is you, and all the good you have the opportunity to accomplish in your lifetime; people who keenly understood and appreciated the importance of research and study in agriculture

and natural resources. Those people backed that understanding and appreciation with their dedication to supporting such work down through the years.

Each recipient in this room today already has accomplished much, or you simply would not be here for these ceremonies. We believe in you, and we look forward with real anticipation to your future successes as you build your careers and advance your fields. We are tremendously pleased to be able to contribute to all that.

Again, congratulations. I also want to extend best wishes for your future endeavors. I expect to hear great things of you.

Let's give all those being recognized a hand.
