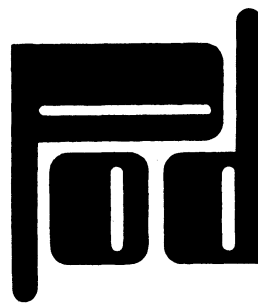

CONFIRMATION

All registrations received before the deadline date of **SEPTEMBER 15**, will receive confirmation by mail. Due to the uncertainties of mail delivery, do not mail the Conference Registration Form after this date. (Be sure to contact the hotel though, to assure a room.) Simply bring the completed registration form with a cheque to the Conference.

REFUNDS

Registration fees paid in advance will be refunded, (less \$20.00 US, or \$25.00 Cdn.) after the conference, provided written request is postmarked no later than September 15.

WEATHER AND DRESS

The October temperature at Montebello will be refreshing but not chilling 15°C to 20°C (approximately 60°F to 70°F) during the day. The evening can be cool at 0°C (32°F).

Sports jackets are normally adequate during the day, and an all-weather coat may be needed for the evening.

Casual dress is appropriate for the conference during the daytime hours. However, there is a strictly enforced rule that **jackets must be worn** in the dining room for the dinner meal.

HOTEL REGISTRATION

Conference participants are responsible for their own housing and should make their room reservations early, using the **HOTEL RESERVATION FORM** found in the middle of this brochure.

Château Montebello requires information one month in advance. The deadline date for assured room reservations is **SEPTEMBER 15**. After that date, the hotel can no longer keep the block of rooms reserved for the conference.

BUSES FROM DORVAL TO MONTEBELLO — October 14

Château Montebello is about 70 miles (1½ hours drive) from Dorval Airport in Montreal. We have arranged for buses to transport participants from the Dorval Hilton Hotel to Montebello. There will be 2 buses, one leaving the hotel at 1:30 p.m. and the other leaving at 4:00 p.m.

BUSES FROM MONTEBELLO TO DORVAL — October 17

For those of you needing to make morning flights there will be an "Early Bird" bus leaving Montebello at 7:30 a.m. suitable for flights leaving after 10:00 a.m. For all others, the bus will leave Montebello at noon, arriving in Dorval at 1:30 p.m. (suitable for flights leaving after 2:00 p.m.)

IF ARRIVING MONTREAL BY PLANE

Please note, Montreal has 2 airports; you do *not* want to go to Mirabel. — You want to go to **DORVAL AIRPORT**.

Proceed to "Flight Arrivals" exit. The Hilton courtesy bus will transport you to the hotel (a 2 minute drive) where we have reserved a hospitality room for PODers wanting bus transportation to Montebello.

IF ARRIVING MONTREAL BY BUS OR TRAIN

On arrival downtown you can either take a taxi to the Dorval Hilton (approximately \$15.00 fare) or an airport bus leaving every hour from several major downtown hotels: the Sheraton Mount Royal Hotel 1455 Peel Street, the Queen Elizabeth Hotel (Canadian National railway station) 900 Dorchester West or the Chateau Champlain 1, Place du Canada. Fare — \$5.00 per person. From the airport proceed as per instructions for participants arriving by plane.

OTHER FORMS OF TRANSPORTATION

Any other form of transportation to and from Montebello must be arranged by the participants.

CAR RENTALS

Cars will be available to rent at the airport. Rates from several major firms; Budget, Tilden, Avis etc. (based on price quotes for Spring 1982) are approximately \$40.00 per day with 200 kilometres a day free. Cost for one week is \$159.00. Weekend specials, \$25.00 per day, 200 kilometres free per day. Montebello is approximately 1½ hours travelling distance from the Dorval Airport. Check your car rental agency for final costs. Reserve in advance, Dorval is a busy airport.

VOYAGEUR BUS

Voyageur has a bus leaving downtown Montreal for Montebello twice a day. Price approximately \$25.00 return. For more information or reservations call 1-514-842-2281.

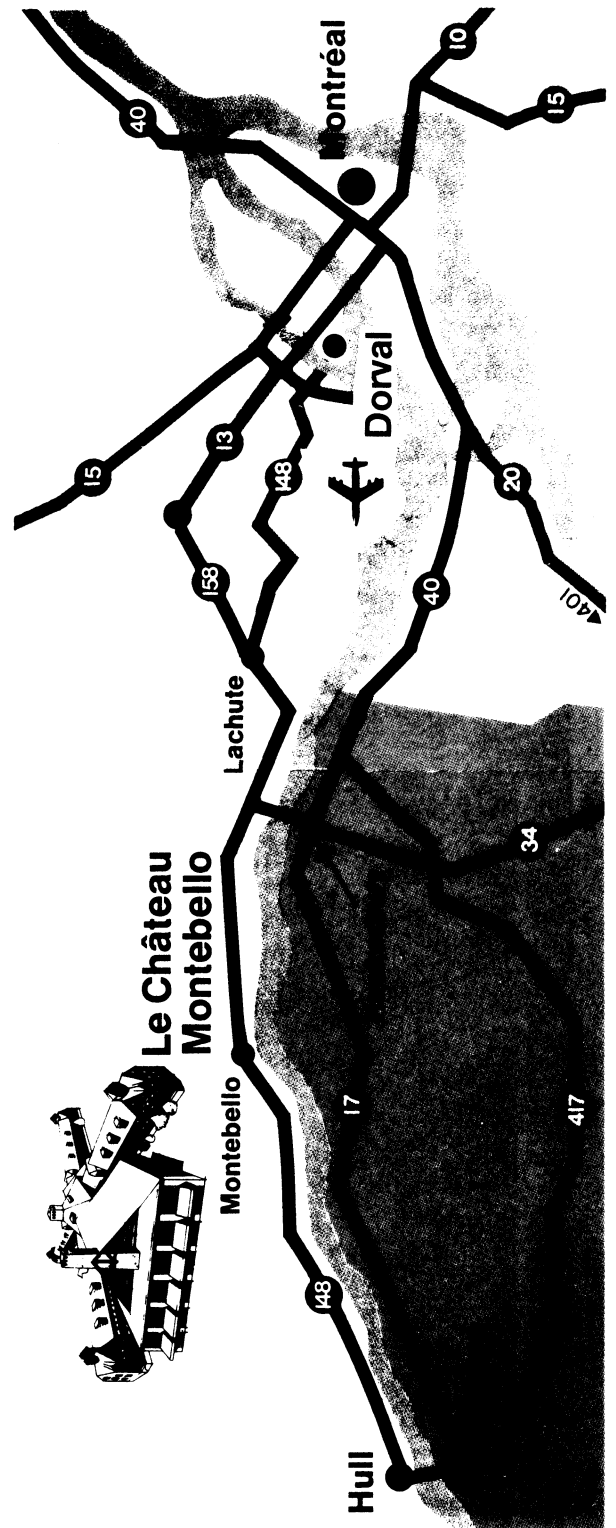
