\*If some corn is available, replace 120 pounds shorts with commeal.

Oyster shell or limestone grit constantly available.

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Feed grain, wheat, oats and barley; depending upon price.

Hopper feed mash and grain to growing turkeys and pullets. Hopper feed only mash to laying hens.

Wetting mash in extremely hot weather will keep up consumption and maintain growth and production.

Feed the same mash to growing pullets, turkeys and laying hens.

Feed requirements for turkeys, pullets and laying hens.

Leghorn pullets require approximately 24 pounds of feed up to laying age. Heavy breed pullets require approximately 28 pounds of feed up to laying age. Laying hens use approximately seven pounds of feed per month (grain and mash). Chickens use approximately equal portions of grain and mash. Turkeys use about one and one-half times as much mash as grain (45# mash and 30# of grain).

Rigid culling is recommended -- it does not pay to feed the scrubs.

Use waste-proof, wind-proof and filth-proof feeders. Provide shade and keep feeders and waterers in shady places.

Get rid of mites -- they sap the profits. Treat houses and fixtures with wood preservative.

Lice are almost as bad as mites. Treat hens with nicotine sulfate or sodium fluoride.
