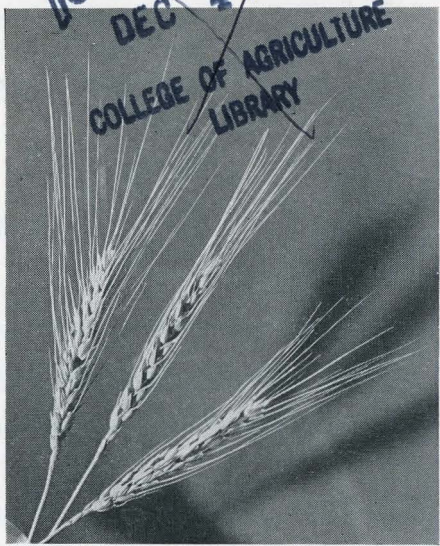

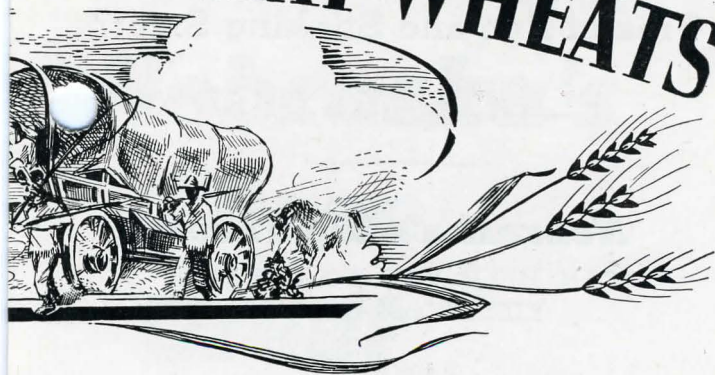

- Very winter hardy.
- Desirable for milling and baking.

Best performance in western Nebraska. Not recommended for the eastern third of the state.

NEBRED

- Resistant to stinking smut.
- Exceptionally winter hardy.
- Medium early maturity.
- Good yield record.
- Excellent for milling and baking.

Best performance in central and western Nebraska.
