Schacht Returns from Fellowship in Namibia

I received a Fulbright Fellowship to join the faculty in the Departments of Agriculture and Nature Conservation at the Polytechnic of Namibia in Windhoek, Namibia from January to December 2011. I conducted research and developed grant proposals focusing on interactions of perennial plants (woody plants and grasses) and soil water that influence bush encroachment on semi-arid grasslands and savannas. This research addresses the critical concern of bush encroachment in southern Africa and deals with many of the same questions that we are researching in the Nebraska Sandhills. I also taught three undergraduate courses in range science, natural resource management, and research methodology at the Polytechnic of Namibia. The Polytech has a student population of about 13,000 and offers diplomas, B.S., and M.S. degrees in most of the major disciplines, including agriculture and nature conservation.

My wife, Carol, traveled to Namibia with me and consulted the Rector (President) and upper administration of the Polytech in team building, strategic planning, and talent identification. We both thoroughly enjoyed being engaged in a growing and dynamic educational institution that recognizes its leadership role in developing the future of Namibia and southern Africa.

Namibia itself is a fascinating country with a diversity of ecosystems, wildlife, and people. Namibia has a unique and successful approach to managing and marketing their natural resources geared towards ecotourism and trophy hunting. This approach makes “Africa” accessible to visitors (mostly Europeans and South Africans)—we took advantage of it and made numerous trips through Namibia.
