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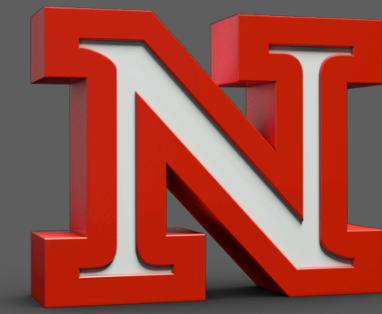
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Single vs Two-Parent Families: Affect on Child Development

Much research has been done on the development of children in single parents and two-parent families. Although research has proven right the negative effects of being raised in a single parent home, it is not true in all cases.

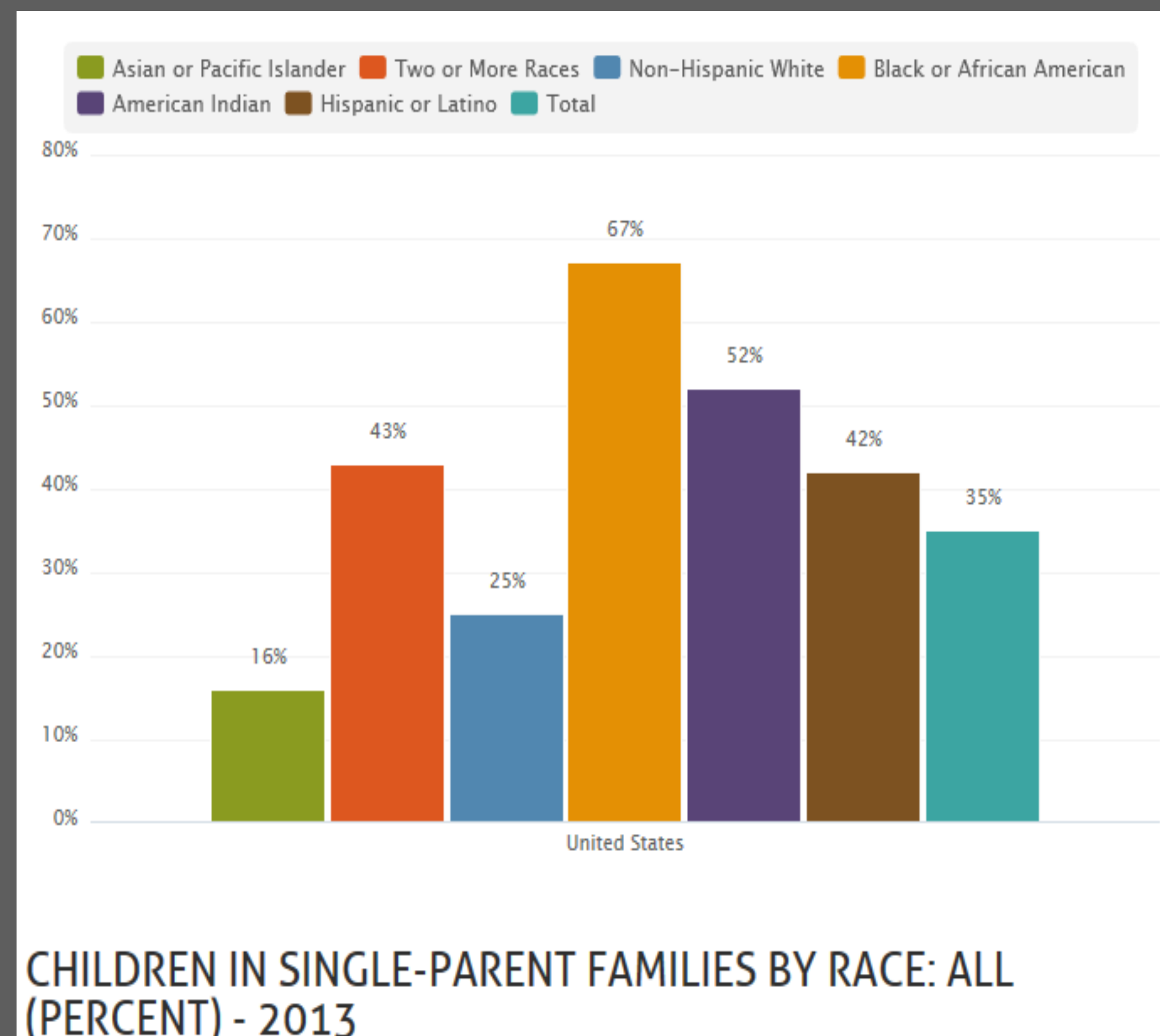
Key Points
