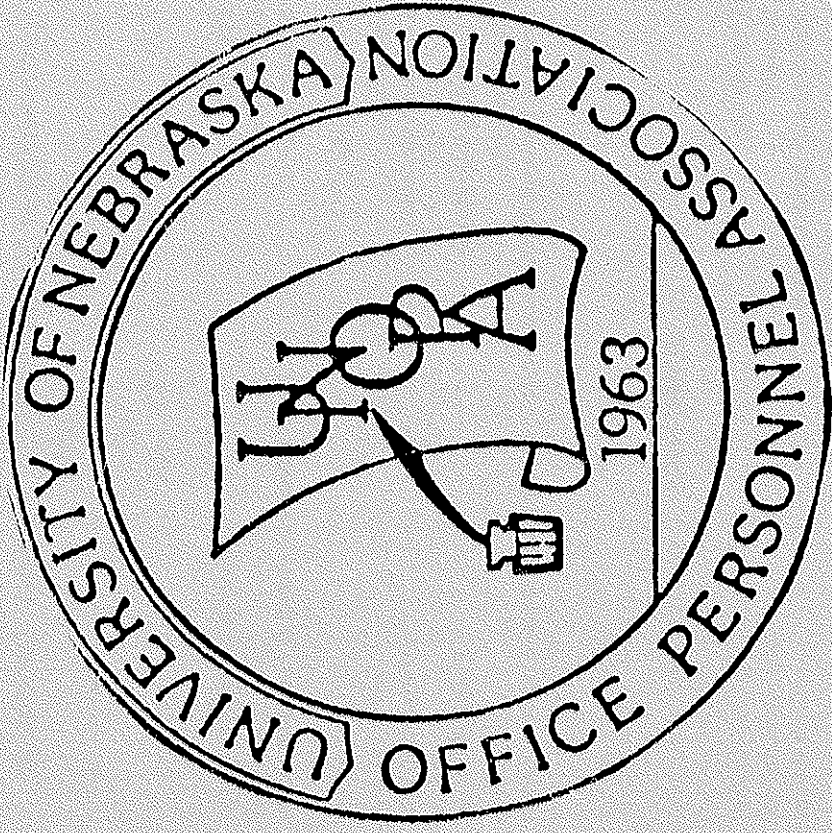
"The Boss"
