REPORT ON INTERNATIONAL CONCLAVE

The 1994 Biennial International Conclave, Gamma Sigma Delta, was held at Kansas State University, Manhattan Kansas, on June 18-21. The Conclave was attended by 17 delegates representing 14 state chapters. The program was focused on improving chapter activities and included several workshops on topics such as chapter operations, constitutions, histories, reports and other normal chapter activities. Chapters were invited to bring poster presentations highlighting their activities. Nebraska Chapter had a poster display as did several others. Dr. Linda Martin, faculty member from Kansas State University and also a trainer for Carnegie Professional Development courses, presented an excellent seminar on "Living, Working and Communicating with Others More Effectively."

A highlight of the meeting was a field trip to Konza Prairie Research Natural Area, a native tall grass prairie in the Flint Hills region of Kansas. Experimental grazing by cattle and bison as well as fire treatments and a number of other research activities are carried out at Konza to look at the ecology under simulated natural conditions on the native tall grass prairie. The visit to Konza Prairie was followed by a stop at the Hays House Restaurant in Council Grove, the oldest continuously operating restaurant west of the Mississippi River. Council Grove also happens to be the home town of our Nebraska Chapter Historian, Dr. Charlie Adams. The dinner group was visited by the editor of the Council Grove paper, an old friend of Dr. Adams who later wrote an article regarding the visit by Gamma Sigma Delta members and guests. Other extra events included tours of KSU facilities and of the US Cavalry Museum at Fort Riley. Conclave delegates were joined at various times by GSD members from the KSU faculty and administration.

The Nebraska Chapter was presented with the Good Neighbor Award, given to recognize that Nebraska had the highest level of attendance of all states immediately neighboring the host state, Kansas. The Nebraska Chapter attendees included President, Dale Vanderholm, Historian, Charles Adams, and International Treasurer, Earl Ellington, as well as Eula Mae Adams, Margaret Vanderholm, and Kim Vanderholm (Nebraska GSD initiate).

The International Executive Committee did an excellent job of planning an informative and interesting Conclave. This is a valuable experience, especially to become exposed to the many activities sponsored by Gamma Sigma Delta chapters around the nation. GSD continues to be a strong, positive force in recognizing scholarly achievement.

Historian Report

We have two new plaques this year to place in C.Y. Thompson Library. The first one received is a Certificate of Recognition from the International Gamma Sigma Delta Office. It bears this inscription: "The Honor Society of Agriculture Gamma Sigma Delta salutes members of the University of Nebraska Chapter on the occasion of their 75th Anniversary May 25, 1993." It is signed by International President, Carole J. Makela and International, Secretary John B. Riley.

The second plaque was presented at the International Conclave of Gamma Sigma Delta on June 21, 1994, at Kansas State University by the Kansas State Eta Chapter. It is inscribed as follows, "Gamma Sigma Delta Good Neighbor Attendance Award, Conclave 1994." The reason we received this award was because we had more in attendance from our chapter than either Missouri, Oklahoma State or Colorado State. There were three in attendance which include: President, Dale Vanderholm; International Treasurer, Earl Ellington and Chapter Historian, Charlie Adams.

There are 436 on our current mailing list which is four less than last year at this time. Of this active membership total 397 are in Nebraska with 245 on campus; 55 in Lincoln; 97 in Greater Nebraska. There are 35 in 20 other states; 1 in Ecuador; 1 in Italy; 1 in Mexico and 1 in Turkey. We have members in Russellville, AR; Sterling, CO; Storrs, CT; Ft. Myers, FL; Hilo and Honolulu, HI; Indianapolis, IN; Ames, Atlantic and Ft. Dodge, IA; Ellinwood, Manhattan (2); Overland Park and Wichita, KS; Ft. Wright and Lexington, KY; Rockville, MO; Battle Creek and Sault Ste. Marie, MI; Eagan, Lakeville and two in Willmar, MN; two in Columbia, MO; Santa Fe and Albuquerque, NM; Fargo, ND; Stillwater, OK; Brookings and Watertown, SD; College Station, TX; Walla Walla, WA and Laramie, WY.

Last year there were 119 prepaid members. This year there are 103 who have paid dues for 1995 or beyond. There are 55 on our retired list and 38 on our Award of Merit list for a total of 93 who are not required to pay dues. Last year, there were 88 who were not required to pay dues. We are still accepting 1994 dues, so if you haven't paid your \$10 dues please send me a check at A213 Animal Sciences, PO Box 830908, Lincoln, NE 68583-0908, as soon as possible. (Check

Since our last Newsletter, the following three inactive members of our chapter have died: Robert A. Chapter Historian Goes Home

to his Alma Mater to attend the 1994 Gamma Sigma Delta International Conclave at Kansas State University on June 18-21, 1994. Charles Adams was initiated as an alumnus member into the Kansas Eta Chapter on May 10, 1946, after returning from four years in the service. On Monday afternoon the conclave group toured the Konza Prairie in the Flint Hills just south of Manhattan. This tallgrass research laboratory consists of 8,616 acres and contains the former Dewey Ranch. Between 1915 and 1920, a large limestone barn and house was built to serve as the ranch headquarters and remain today as the Konza Prairie head-quarters.

The tour continued on south about 35 miles to Council Grove, which is the county seat of Morris County where Charles grew up. Here the group had dinner in the restaurant of the Hayes House built in 1857 by the town's founder Seth Hays, and is the oldest continuous restaurant west of the Mississippi. Over the years the building has been used as a mail distribution point, a gathering place for court cases and church services and the site of the publication of the first newspaper. The current publisher, Don McNeal, gave us a brief welcome to the city and in the next days Council Grove *Republican* he had an article about us entitled "Elite Group of Ag Educators Visits Council Grove Monday." He even took space to list the names of all in attendance at the KSU conclave. On the previous Saturday evening, the group traveled to Fort Riley where they had a self-guided tour of the US Cavalry Museum. This was followed by a pie dessert reception at the Custer House near the museum. The members of the Eta Chapter at Kansas State University were excellent hosts for our conclave. Needless to say, Charlie and his wife, Eula Mae, enjoyed the entire four days.
