REPORT ON MEMBERSHIP

This Newsletter will be sent to 493 Active Members which is just seven less than the first Newsletter mailing last year. At that time we included mailings to forty-four who had been initiated at some other chapter or at Nebraska and had never been asked to be on our active list since coming on the staff of IANR at Nebraska. Of those forty-four there were twenty-six who chose to become active in our chapter and we are very pleased to welcome them as active members. GAMMA SIGMA DELTA 47TH CHAPTER IN HONDURAS

On October 28, 1989, Escuela Agricola Panamericana (Pan-American School of Agriculture) was installed as Gamma Sigma Delta's 47th Chapter. Twenty-three members were identified and recognized as charter members. An initiation of 11 new members was held in conjunction with the installation. Past Gamma Sigma Delta International President, Lowell Moser, was at the school for the new chapter's installation.

To introduce you to the Escuela Agricola Panamericana, the following description was briefed from Gamma Sigma Delta News Notes:

Escuela Agricola Panamericana, better known as "Zamorano" because of the traditional name of the farm where it is located, is a private, international college, established in 1941 with the authorization and support of the Government of Honduras.

Zamorano is widely recognized as the college with the highest standards in tropical America. This is the result of an unparalleled history of stability and continuity. The School does not depend on any government and is not subjected to the whims of world politics.

The school is located 25 miles east of Tegucigalpa in the picturesque Valley of the Yeguare River. Because of the altitude (3,000 feet), the year-round weather conditions are pleasant and represent an average climate of the home countries of the international student body. It is excellent for both agriculture and animal husbandry, and thus ideally suited for teaching agriculture and conducting research on a wide variety of tropical crops and problems. The School spans over 12,000 acres of land of many types including rain forests in the higher areas. A large variety of plant species from lowland, humid areas to the cold Landean-type areas in the higher reaches expose students to a wide range of agriculture.

The annual program begins the first week of January and continues through the end of November, leaving the month of December as the annual vacation. The "Agronomo" program, which is the first degree offered, consists of nine trimesters totaling 33 months. The "Ingerniero Agronomo" program, the second degree offered, comprises 12 trimesters, 44 months. The first program is comprehensive, giving the agronomo an excellent foundation in tropical agriculture. The second program becomes more specialized and delves deeper into modern agricultural science stressing research and individual work.
