STUDY LEADING TO A MASTER OF SCIENCE DEGREE IN LEADERSHIP EDUCATION

Programs leading to the Master of Science in Leadership Education provide the opportunity for in-depth study in one or more areas: Leadership Development, Teaching and Extension Education, Distance Education or Nutrition Outreach Education.

Depending on your interests, the M.S. program will give you the opportunity to:

- Investigate the foundations and applications in leadership, teaching and learning, and distance education.
- Specialize in a specific area of leadership education.
- Use methods of research and scholarship to examine one topic closely (either in a thesis or special paper).
- Build skills in your chosen area of leadership, teaching and extension, or nutrition outreach.
- Apply knowledge gained in actual settings, such as education, agribusiness, non-profit, community and government organizations and agencies.

The Master of Science in Leadership Education may be earned with one of four concentrations:

Leadership Development Emphasis

Teaching and Extension Education Specialization

Distance Education Specialization

Nutrition Outreach Education Specialization

Degree Requirements and Options:

Master of Science in Leadership Education

The Master of Science degree may be earned by successfully completing a minimum of 30 credits (Option I) to 36 credits (Options II, III) beyond the bachelor's degree. Option I includes a thesis, Option II is non-thesis, but with a research project and minor, and Option III is non-thesis, non-minor, and requires more advanced coursework. Both Options II and III require 36 credits. (See the current University of Nebraska-Lincoln Graduate Studies Bulletin for a complete statement of all requirements for a master's degree.) Emphasis LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

With roots in the traditions of youth and human resource development for agribusiness, the Department has developed a unique leadership development program available as an area of emphasis in the Master of Science degree. The program immerses individuals, both academically and professionally, in the increasingly complex area of leadership. One of the greatest needs for success in any endeavor is the ability to effectively communicate, influence, and be able to lead in one form or another. Completion of the Leadership Development emphasis creates opportunities for students to gain the academic background and experiences to provide interpersonal and leadership skill development for persons involved in communities, public service organizations, and in business and industry. Students' graduate programs are multidisciplinary and contain opportunities for experiential activities in a variety of leadership and organizational development settings.





Specialization DISTANCE EDUCATION

ith the advent of on-line learning and video **VV** conferencing, distance education has exploded. The specialization in Distance Education is designed for individuals in formal or non-formal settings, in business, training, or education, in post-secondary institutions as well as pre-K-12 settings. Students study distance education in its video and digital formats, focusing on the ever-changing state of technology, the growing research base, the developing and competing philosophies, and the individual and systems management of distance education. AgLEC graduates seek professional careers in both public and private sectors, sometimes using the specialization to support another content area, teaching via distance education situations or evaluating distance education processes. Some may act as consultants and trainers in business and government, while others may use the M.S. distance education specialization as a foundation for doctoral work in education or administrative disciplines.



ationally, there are very few specialized programs in the area of nutrition education. This specialization is unique since it combines the expertise of two departments: Agricultural Leadership, Education and Communication, and Nutrition and Health Sciences. Leadership Studies is a specialization within the Human Sciences Doctoral program at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. And, this program is one of the few doctoral-level leadership programs in the country!

A Doctoral Specialization in Leadership Studies will benefit current and future leaders in communities, government agencies, and private sector organizations. It is ideal for preparing individuals for leadership consulting, organizational change, training and organizational development, multimedia and distance education, personnel and human resource management, leadership faculty positions, entrepreneurship, and community facilitation.

DOCTORAL DEGREES

Two doctoral degrees may be awarded in this program - a Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) or a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.).

The Ed.D. program:

- is designed for individuals who want practical application of the leadership studies program in the workplace
- requires a minimum of 96 semester hours beyond the baccalaureate degree, including research tools
- includes a minimum of 6 semester hours of practicum
- requires completion of a dissertation that studies an applied area in the leadership field
- the dissertation will typically be assigned 12 hours of credit

The Ph.D. program:

- is designed for individuals who want to develop their researchbased credentials in the area of leadership studies (potential leadership researchers, educators and trainers)
- requires a minimum of 90 semester hours beyond the baccalaureate degree excluding research tools (6-12 hours, depending on student background) requirements
- requires completion of a dissertation that makes a substantive research contribution to the leadership field
- the dissertation will typically be assigned 20 nours of credit
