

2021 Nebraska Chapter Awards The Honor Society of Agriculture, Gamma Sigma Delta

The Chapter's Annual Initiation and Awards Reception, originally scheduled for January 30, 2022, was (due to continued high numbers of COVID-19 cases in Lancaster County) rescheduled and held on Sunday afternoon, March 27th. The chapter recognized five faculty award recipients, eleven student finalists and three student award recipients, as well as eleven undergraduates, one graduate student and two faculty inducted into membership. The event was held in the Nebraska East Union, Great Plains room.



Award of Merit Recipients

Both of this year's recipients of the Distinguished Achievement in Agriculture Award of Merit, the Chapter's highest award, were out of the country at the time of the recognition reception. Dr. Michael Boehm, Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources (IANR) Vice Chancellor, announced the recipients: **Dr. Richard B. Ferguson**, above left, Professor &,Vice Chancellor of the Rwanda Institute for Conservation Agriculture, nominated by Dr. Marjorie Kostelnik; and **Dr. Janos Zempleni**, above right, Willa Cather Professor of Molecular Nutrition and Director of the Nebraska Center for the Prevention of Obesity Disease, nominated by Dr. Robert Wright. The nominators spoke regarding their nominees' careers and accomplishments and accepted the awards on their behalf. Ferguson was inducted into GSD in 1981, while a graduate student at Kansas State. Zempleni, who joined the UNL faculty in 2001, was inducted into the Nebraska Chapter in 2004. He received the Chapter Research Award in 2007.



James Henry Williams Jr., 100, of Lincoln, died February 15, 2019. He was born in Los Angeles, Calif., to James Henry, Sr. and Addie Myrtle (Blowers) Williams, on July 14, 1918. Professor Emeritus, University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Attended UCLA 2 years; Oregon State University, B.S.; Iowa State University. M.S. & Ph.D; Horticulturist, Beverly Hills, CA; farmed in Willamette Valley, Ore.; Professor of Agronomy 33 years UN-L, researched variety of improvement and production practices of soybeans and other oil seed crops, taught courses in Agronomy.

Member, American Society of Agronomy and the Society of Economic Botany. Recognized for research and contributions to agriculture by American Society of Agronomy (Fellow); American Soybean Association Production Research Award; Nebraska. Soybean Association and Nebraska Crop Improvement Association. Honorary societies: Alpha Zeta, and Sigma Xi. Inducted into Nebraska Chapter Gamma Sigma Delta May 1,1956; received the Research & the Award of Merit in 1983. He served as Treasurer, Secretary, Vice-President & President, 1977-81. WWII Army Air Corps veteran, Europe with 451st Bomb Group, Italy.

Was an Eagle Scout and later served 10 years as Boy Scout leader in

Oregon and Lincoln. Member Masonic Lodge, Eastern Star, and Royal Arch Masons. Charter member of Lincoln Northeast Kiwanis and Golden K Kiwanis.

Preceded in death by wife of 63 years, Mary Louise (Heard) Williams. Survivors, sons, William and Robert and granddaughter, Faith, all of Lincoln.

Private memorial service was at Eastmont Towers. Memorials to Monarch Hospice by Eastmont Towers Foundation.



Howard Lyle Wiegers, 105, died peacefully on Saturday, April 24, 2021. Howard was born on July 20,1915 on the family farm in Western, Nebraska to John and Alice Wiegers. He married Mary Irene "Mickie" (Caldwell) in 1942. He earned a bachelor's degree from University of Nebraska's College of Agriculture before moving to California to work for Lockheed during WWII. While in California, Howard sent for Mickie and they married. After the war, Howard studied briefly at Caltech and the University of Utah before the couple returned to Nebraska, where he earned a master's degree at UNL. They bought an acreage just north of Lincoln, where they raised their two children, Jo Anne and John.

Howard began his career as a professor of poultry science in 1949 at UNL's College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources, ultimately retiring in 1986. He was inducted into the Nebraska Chapter Gamma Sigma Delta May 2, 1955, serving as Secretary, Vice-President and President, 1961-64. He is credited with making significant advances in turkey fertility processes. In addition to poultry science, Howard developed courses in wildlife management and was instrumental in developing what is now the Fisheries and Wildlife program. The Wildlife Club's annual award -- the Howard L. Wiegers Nebraska Outstanding Wildlife Conservation Award – was named in his honor.


In addition to teaching, Howard was a passionate advisor. During his career he advised hundreds of students, helping them navigate everything from course work to homesickness and career options. Howard's advisees returned his generosity by writing and visiting over the decades. His home was filled with letters and postcards from former students, many of whom kept in touch with him for over forty years. Some students were lucky enough to take a course that culminated in a summer wilderness canoe trip to the Boundary Waters, where they would camp, hike, fish, and swap tales around the campfire for two weeks.

Howard undoubtedly learned his legendary storytelling abilities from his parents and beloved older brother, Claude, who passed away at the age of 104. Howard's stories, whether they were about setting fish traps in a river, riding to town with Pop, or portaging in Canada, would invariably begin with the phrase: "Say, did I ever tell you about ...?" Each tale would unravel slowly, tricking the listener into believing he'd lost his train of thought. Then, with a twinkle in his eye, he would suddenly end the tale, having come full circle – much to the listener's delight. Many Father's Days were spent taking turns around a hand-crank ice cream maker while Howard entertained his family.

Howard and Mickie divorced in 1975, and he later married Wanda (Maret). They spent the winters in Texas and would return each spring with crates of citrus fruit and Mexican vanilla. Howard was a member of First United Methodist Church and the Lincoln East Rotary Club.

He was preceded in death by his parents, brother Claude, sister Reva, Irene Caldwell Stevens, and Wanda. He is survived by his children, JoAnne (Gordon) Bair of Lincoln and John (Chris) Wiegers of Pickrell; grandchildren, Amanda Bair of Plattsmouth, Cynthia (Brad) Bair Van Dam of Washington, DC, Andrea (Ivan) Haas of Woodinville, WA, Carly (Kyle) Parrish of Auburn; great-grandchildren, Violet Haas, Natalie Parrish, Landon Parrish, Grady Haas; and nieces and nephew, Linda Lewis of Texas, Judy Greene of Virginia, and John King of Iowa.

A celebration of Howard's life was held in July 2021 at First United Methodist Church. Memorials may be made to the Howard Wiegers Student Travel Support Fund at the University of Nebraska Foundation (nufoundation.org) or First United Methodist Church of Lincoln, Nebraska.



Terry J. Klopfenstein, 82, of Lincoln, died on April 30, 2021. Mr. Klopfenstein was born March 10, 1939, to Donald & Rozella (Miller) Klopfenstein in Wauseon, Ohio.

After completing his bachelor's, master's, and doctorate degrees from The Ohio State University where he was inducted into membership in Gamma Sigma Delta January 4, 1961, Terry joined the University of Nebraska-Lincoln as a ruminant nutritionist in 1965. Calling it his "dream job", Terry had only one position at UNL – ruminant researcher and teacher. He received the Nebraska Chapter Gamma Sigma Delta Teaching Award of Merit in 1971 and the Research Award of Merit in 1982. Terry held the University of Nebraska Wagner Professorship from 1989-2007, the first endowed chair position in the Animal Science Department. As one of the premier research programs at UNL and nationwide, his findings have had a tremendous economic impact on cattle feeding in Nebraska and the nation. Terry was a pioneer in using

corn byproducts from the ethanol and sweetener industries to supplement cattle feeding creating a winwin-win scenario for cattle feeders, grain farmers and the milling industries. Principles learned in the evaluation of protein sources, protein requirements and growing/finishing systems have been used by the feed and livestock industries. Research with grazing and treating crop residues have been adopted by cattle producers both within the US and internationally. Terry authored over 300 refereed articles and over 1000 abstracts and technical articles. For many years, Terry was the leader of the ruminant nutrition program at Nebraska, both on campus and with the research and development centers across the state. Terry believed that research programs should be a Team Effort. He never talked about "his" research program. It was always "our" program or Nebraska's program. Terry mentored hundreds of graduate students in his 47-year career at UNL many of whom now hold important positions at universities, major agribusinesses, consulting firms, government agencies and as leaders in the livestock industry. Terry took a great deal of pride in working with students. Terry instilled motivation for knowledge in his students. He believed a faculty member's most important assignment was to teach students. Teaching included not only learning the fundamentals of science, but also helping students to mature and succeed.

Because of the need for well-trained feedlot managers, the Feedlot Management Internship was initiated in 1988 and 179 students have completed the program. In 2003, an endowed fund was established in his honor at the University of Nebraska Foundation in recognition of his teaching accomplishments and contribution to the beef feedlot industry. Today, the funds provide support and recognition for students with an interest in beef production. In addition to his teaching and research activities, Terry served as President of the Federation of Animal Science Societies and President of the American Society of Animal Science as well its Midwest section. Over the years, Terry received numerous recognitions and awards from the scientific community and livestock industry. He was awarded the American Society of Animal Science highest honors: Morrison Award, Fellow Award, Teaching Award, and Nutrition Award. He was inducted into the Ohio State Animal Science and College of Ag Hall of Fame and the Nebraska Hall of Ag Achievement. Throughout his career at UNL, Terry worked closely with the agriculture industries. Born in Minden, Nebraska, June 21, 1957, to Ned Smith Raun & Esther Burris Zangger Raun, Bill grew up the youngest of six. In Bill's early years, his family moved to Mexico, then to Colombia, where he made dear friendships, discovered his love of golf, became fluent in Spanish, & developed his interest in international agriculture. He spent his school years in Colombia & his summers working at the family farm in Nebraska with his brothers & cousins. Though he remained a Colombian at heart, he moved back to the U.S. for his senior year at Stillwater High, where

he became the state golf champion and first met his future wife, Tanya Colclasure. Bill earned bachelor's & master's degrees in plant & soil sciences from Oklahoma State University in 1979 &1982 and a Ph.D. in agronomy from the University of Nebraska–Lincoln in 1985. He was inducted into Gamma Sigma Delta at Nebraska on November 18, 1984. From 1985 to 1991, Bill worked with CIMMYT in Guatemala & Mexico as a Regional Maize Agronomist, where he serviced nine countries in Central America & the Caribbean.

After six years with CIMMYT, Bill returned to the U.S., where he & Tanya reconnected during Eskimo Joe's weekend. After five months & a one-week engagement, they were married by Judge Charles Headrick at the Payne County Courthouse on New Year's Eve day. Two years later, Anne arrived, then Kate & Chris, & finally Dana. Bill's love for his work was eclipsed only by his love for his family, for whom Bill was always a fierce believer & supporter. Bill was a passionate member of the Catholic Church, having been converted by the witness & example of his dear cousins, Chris & Kevin Raun, & the life of his nephew, Nathan, whom Bill thought of daily. He taught 5th grade Sunday School in the Stillwater Catholic community for 15 years.

Bill was a Regents Professor and Sitlington Chair of Agriculture at OSU. His research focused primarily on improving nitrogen use efficiency in cereal crops working in tandem with mechanical and electrical engineers. The GreenSeeker sensor that is now sold commercially around the world is a product of the work that Dr. John Solie, Dr. Marvin Stone, Dr. Randy Taylor and he developed. Their team of plant and engineering scientists has collaborative sensor-based projects in Argentina, Mexico, India, China, Australia, Canada, and Kenya. Bill maintained active GSD membership at OSU and was awarded the Chapter's Experienced Research Scientist Award in 2009. During his career, he developed a hand planter that increases crop yield and reduces pesticide exposure, and he sent 117 graduate students on short- and long-term work-study projects with CIMMYT in Mexico, Kenya, Nigeria, China, and India. Bill was a fellow of the American Society of Agronomy and Soil Science Society of America, and he served as a major advisor for 103 graduate degrees conferred to 84 students, 47 of whom came from the developing world. He authored over 254 refereed journals and holds 13 U.S. patents.

Bill is preceded in death by his parents, his brother, Larry, and his mother-in-law, Shirley Colclasure. He is survived by his wife, his four children, his son-in-law, Paul, his granddaughter, Georgia, his siblings, Kathi Hromas Blazer, Barby Kroening, Rich Raun, and Ed Raun, their families, and his many students.

Mary Rosalind Morris, 101, of Lincoln, passed away March 26, 2022. The daughter of Celia (Evans) and Aneurin Morris, Rosalind was born in her maternal grandparent's home, Ruthin, Wales, May 8, 1920. Her brother, William Penri, was born in 1922. In 1925 the family moved to Canada and by 1930 were settled on a fruit farm near the town of Forest in western Ontario.

After graduating Forest High School, Rosalind spent four years at the Ontario Agricultural College (now University of Guelph) where she earned a B.S. in Agriculture. She accepted a graduate assistantship in the Plant Breeding Department, Cornell University, Ithaca, New York. Her thesis research involved genetic studies on buckwheat, an important cover crop in the region. Her financial support was a teaching assistantship under Professor Robert Cushing, who had gone to Cornell from the University of Nebraska.

During her time at Cornell, her family suffered the loss of her brother Penri, in a bombing mission with the British Royal Air Force over Germany in World War II.

After receiving a Ph.D. at Cornell in 1946, Rosalind started a career of 43 years in the University of Nebraska Agronomy Department under the leadership of Dr. Elvin Frolik. She taught two courses and part of a third course to graduate students. Due to concern about harmful effects of radiation on crop plants, her first research tested the effects of different types of radiation on corn genes & chromosomes. In order to advance her knowledge in this area, she spent the year 1949-50 on a Nebraska fellowship at the California Institute of Technology under the guidance of Professor Albert Longley. Rosalind also spent several months in 1956-57 in Sweden and England on a Guggenheim fellowship to enhance her research and teaching experiences.

Upon her return to Nebraska in 1957 she joined the wheat research team led by V. Johnson, J. Schmidt, & P. Mattern. The rest of her career was devoted to developing & testing chromosomesubstitution lines in bread-wheat varieties. This involved meticulous microscope observations by Rosalind & her assistants. Many of these lines were shared with wheat scientists in different countries. Rosalind was a trailblazer for women in agronomy when it was unusual to see women in such roles. In 1978 she was the first woman to receive the honorary title of Fellow from the American Society of Agronomy. She belonged to a number of scientific societies & presented results of her research at meetings in the U.S., Canada, Egypt, England, India, & Japan. After retirement Rosalind and Dr. Mary Lou Pritchard took a number of trips within the U.S. & to several countries to attend Elderhostel programs, Welsh Society annual meetings, & cultural gatherings as well as sightseeing trips. During their trips to England & Wales, Rosalind visited relatives in their homes. Locally, Rosalind and her dog Cym regularly visited several Lincoln parks to pick up litter. She received two awards for these efforts with Cym's name on one plaque. She was a member of local & Nebraska state-wide bird-study organizations and went on numerous bird-watching trips to different areas of Nebraska. Rosalind was a long-time member of the Nebraska Academy of Sciences, the local branch of the American Association of University Women, and the St. David's Welsh Society of Nebraska. Rosalind was inducted into the Nebraska Chapter Gamma Sigma Delta May 7, 1953. She served as Secretary 196061 and was the recipient of the chapter Award of Merit in 1980 and Teaching Award in 1985.

Per Rosalind's request, there was no memorial service. Her body was cremated, and the ashes deposited in the family grave at Forest, Ontario, Canada.
