

He was a part of many professional organizations and local groups leading improvements throughout the communities across Nebraska. This fund made a reverberating impact both locally and all over the world due to John's pursuit throughout his life and career to be a faithful servant to the earth and its people. John did so many wonderful things during his lifetime and transformed and was transformed by so many lives. His achievements while vast and impressive were not what was important to John. What was most important to John was his faith, and his commitment to caring for the earth and people. John was hopeful for the future, compassionate, curious, adventurous, tenacious and a great story teller. He was always seeking out the answers to life's big questions and had such a zest for life it was contagious. He believed

He believed everyone has a gift to share with the world, and enjoyed talking with others about their lives and dreams. He said he never met a stranger. He could form a friendship with anyone and valued a good honest conversation. When he gave his acceptance speech for the Onassis Award he added onto the end of his speech, unbeknownst to those who had approved it. His words were, "We enter the future with apprehension about the changes needed to sustain the earth and its people. 
developing his lifelong love of orange marmalade.

He entertained crowds as a fill-in announcer at Beatrice High School JV football games. Paul became a Teammates mentor in his retirement, mentoring several young people one-on-one over the years. After retiring, Paul's days were filled with grandchildren, meeting friends for coffee and breakfast, Kiwanis, service to the church, attending Husker sports games, feeding and watching the wildlife in his backyard, and visiting unique museums around Nebraska and the Midwest. Paul was a dedicated Husker fan, keeping up with football, baseball, softball, and volleyball, often watching and listening to several games at the same time. He was a lifelong (MSU) Spartan fan, wearing both red and green on GameDay when NU played Michigan State. Paul was known best as a self-less, hardworking man. He never turned down an opportunity to learn, educate others and share his knowledge, and share life's anecdotes. He was a community leader, demonstrating the very best of "Nebraska Nice" and teaching us how to live our best lives, with the most positive outlook and hope for the future. Many people were encouraged by cards from Paul to recognize birthdays and accomplishments, or just to let them know he thought of them. Paul will be remembered as

an amazing father and grandparent, colleague, friend, and devout Christian.
