Brief History of AFMIC (*Total Manpower*)

- WWII (33)*** ● U.S. Army Medical Intelligence Office Under SG

- 1963 (ABOUT 40)*** ● DIA Assumes GMI Medical Intelligence Mission
● Army SG Continues to Perform Medical S&TI

- 1972-3 (ABOUT 40)*** ● DIA has RIF: Medical Intelligence Division Abolished
● Army SG Assumes Entire Medical Intelligence Mission
● USAMIIA Formed (Located at Forrestal Building)

- 1979 (28)*** ● USAMIIA Move to Fort Detrick (Building 862)

- 1981 (34)*** ● Congress Eliminates All Funding for USAMIIA
● DIA/GDIP Program Manager Appeals
● Congress Allows Re-establishment of USAMIIA
 - Must be Tri-Service
 - Must be an Intelligence Activity

- 1982 (36)*** ● Tri-Service AFMIC Established
● Army (DCSINT and SG) Executive Agent

- 1986 (62)*** ● New Building on Fort Detrick
● First Non-Army Director

- 1992 (82)*** ● AFMIC becomes "DIA Field Production Center"
