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## *NHPRC Announces Deadlines for Fellowships and Camp Edit*

The tenth annual Institute for Historical Editing will take place 19–31 July 1981, in Madison, Wisconsin. Jointly sponsored by the National Historical Publications and Records Commission, the University of Wisconsin–Madison, and the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, the institute provides theoretical and practical instruction in documentary editing. Applicants should hold a master's degree in history or American civilization. A limited number of full and partial study grants are available.

The National Historical Publications and Records Commission also announces the 1980–1981 competition for fellowships in historical editing. Participating projects are the *Documentary History of Freedmen in Southern Society, 1861–1867* (University of Maryland), the

*Documentary Relations of the Southwest* (Arizona State Museum, University of Arizona), the *Documentary History of the Ratification of the Constitution* (University of Wisconsin), the *Papers of Black Abolitionists* (Florida State University), and the *Documentary History of the Supreme Court, 1789–1800* (Supreme Court Historical Society). Fellows receive a stipend of \$13,000 and spend twelve months in training at one of the projects. Candidates should hold a Ph.D. in an appropriate field of history or should have completed all requirements for the doctorate except the dissertation. Competence in Spanish is required for the Southwest fellowship. Institute or fellowship applications are available from the NHPRC, National Archives, Washington, DC 20408. The application deadline is 1 March, 1981.
