- For decades across Burma, human rights abuses, many of them committed by the Burmese army, or Tatmadaw, have been rampant. Common tools of state control include torture, rape, and forced conscription of child soldiers.
- Due to the annual threats to their lives and villages, many Karen must flee for their lives into the mountains and thick jungle.
