1999 ADE Conference

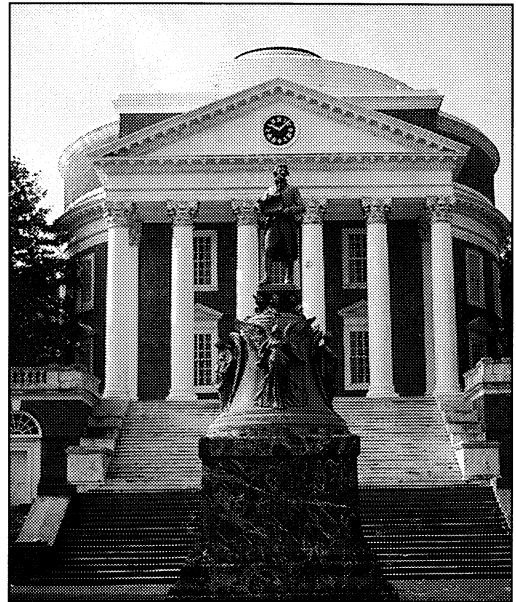
Charlottesville, Virginia, will play host to the 22nd annual meeting of the ADE, October 7-9, 1999. Charlottesville is situated in the rolling countryside of the Virginia Piedmont, at the foot of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Conference attendees will stay at the Omni Hotel, located on the city's historic downtown pedestrian mall, where they will find an eclectic mix of shops, coffeehouses, used bookstores, small art galleries, and fine restaurants. Conference sessions will be held at the hotel.

Charlottesville is home to the University of Virginia (just a twenty-minute walk from the Omni), where the rotunda, pavilions, and other buildings that composed Jefferson's design of an "academical village" are still in use today. Thursday night's reception will be held in the garden of the Colonnade Hotel, on the historic grounds, and the evening will include a tour of that area. A tour of James Madison's Orange County home, Montpelier, has been arranged for Saturday afternoon. A box lunch will be provided, and there will be time to tour the property's extensive grounds, which include a formal garden, specimen trees, and archaeological sites. Participants will enjoy a tour of the house, in which a new permanent exhibit on the Madisons has recently been installed. After leaving Montpelier, the tour will stop at Barboursville Vineyards for their Autumn Explosion and Barrel Tasting.

Other attractions include Jefferson's Monticello and James Monroe's Ash Lawn, both only minutes away from Charlottesville. For those staying an extra day or who do not mind an hour or two of driving, the area offers a host of Civil War historic sites, including Richmond, Fredericksburg, Spotsylvania, and Appomattox.
