The functions and methods of the Nebraska Ornithologists' Union Records Committee (NOURC) are described in its bylaws (NOURC 2010). The committee's purpose is to provide a procedure for documenting unusual bird sightings and to establish a list of all documented birds for Nebraska. Species for which the NOURC seeks documentation (NOURC Review List) can be found at the NOU website www.NOUbirds.org.

Starting in 2020, the NOURC will deal mainly with those species deemed as Accidental on the "Official List of the Birds of Nebraska". Casual species and out-of-range species will continue to be summarized in the "Seasonal Reports" of the Nebraska Bird Review and will be evaluated by Nebraska eBird reviewers (if submitted on that platform).

All records mentioned here are available to interested persons at the NOU archives at the University of Nebraska State Museum (UNSM), Lincoln, NE. Interested parties should contact the current NOU Librarian, whose address can be found in the latest issue of The Nebraska Bird Review (NBR).

NOURC Criteria for Accepted Records:

In order for a record to be accepted, a minimum of six votes in favor is required with no more than one dissenting vote (NOURC 2010). Records in the following categories are classified as accepted:

- I-S - a diagnostic, labeled specimen exists
- I-P - diagnostic, labeled photographic evidence exists
- I-R - a diagnostic, labeled recording exists
- II - three or more independently written diagnostic documentations of the same bird exist
- III - one or two independently written diagnostic documentations of the same bird exist

Each account of an accepted record includes a brief statement noting the species, class, date, location, and initial(s) of observers. This report summarizes all records accessioned in 2019, discusses any new additions to the state list, and reports any changes in firmness of data (i.e. placement in the above acceptance categories) of Nebraska birds. Additionally, the list reflects changes in frequency of occurrence, as determined by the NOU Records Committee, which reviewed records of bird occurrences in Nebraska for 2010 - 2019. Frequency of occurrence is indicated by the following terms (NOURC 2017):

Regular - acceptably reported in 9-10 of the past 10 years.
Casual - acceptably reported in 4-7 of the past 10 years.
Accidental - acceptably reported in 0-2 of the past 10 years.
Extirpated - not acceptably reported in the past 50 years.
Extinct - no longer found alive anywhere in the world.

The frequency of occurrence for any species that is acceptably reported in 3 or 8 of the last 10 years is discussed by the committee and placed in a category felt most appropriate by the committee.

With this report, the following changes are made to the “Official List of the Birds of Nebraska: 2017” (NOURC 2017).

Nebraska State List:

The following includes all revisions made by the American Ornithological Society (Chesser et al. 2019) in 2019 including scientific name changes and taxonomic realignment that affect the current published “Official List of the Birds of Nebraska: 2017” (NOURC 2017, www.NOUBirds.org). This report includes all accounts submitted during the 2019 calendar year covering 99 records with accession numbers 2159 – 2257.

2019 Additions/Deletions to the "Official List of the Birds of Nebraska":

There were no new species added in 2019.

The “Official List of the Birds of Nebraska” stands at **463** species.

2019 Changes in Frequency of Occurrence:

1. Black-bellied Whistling-Duck (*Dendrocygna autumnalis*): Regular.

Changes Involving Nebraska Species Due to Taxonomic Revisions (2019):

The Sixtieth supplement to the American Ornithological Society’s Check-list of North American Birds (Chesser et al. 2019) effected the following changes to the “Official List” of Nebraska Birds.

White-winged Scoter was split – the North American species will retain the name White-winged Scoter but the scientific name will change to (*Melanitta deglandi*).

The Ground-Doves group lose their hyphens; which affects one Nebraska species:
Common Ground Dove (*Columbina passerina*).

The Charadrius plovers undergo a new sequence. The new sequence for Nebraska plovers in this group will be:

Killdeer (*Charadrius vociferus*)

Brant (*Branta bernicla*)

1. A photograph (Class 1-P, KG via JGJ) was received of an adult (*B. b. hrota*) that was shot 07 November 2019 near Clay Center, Clay County. Accession # 2250.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Black-chinned Hummingbird (*Archilochus alexandri*)

1. An adult male was photographed (Class 1-P, RSt) 22 June 2019 in Gering, Scotts Bluff County. Accession # 2200.
2. Additional photos (Class 1-P, KD) 22 June 2019 of the above bird. Accession # 2201.
3. A single bird coming to a private feeder in the Wildcat Hills, Scotts Bluff County was present from 25-29 August 2018. Photographs (Class 1-P, CC) 29 August 2019. Accession # 2202.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on the preceding species.

Anna's Hummingbird (*Calypte anna*)

1. An immature male was photographed (Class 1-P, MSm via RS) 21 June 2019 at a feeder in Gering, Scotts Bluff County. Accession # 2199.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Purple Gallinule (*Porphyrio martinicus*)

1. An immature bird was discovered trapped in a semi-open courtyard at a school in Hastings, Adams County on 13 September 2019. The bird was photographed (Class 1-P, HPD), captured and released unharmed at a nearby wetland. This constitutes the second record for this species in Nebraska. Accession #2219.

Common Gallinule (*Gallinula galeata*)

1. An adult bird was photographed (Class 1-P, JGJ) 17 June 2019 at Troester WPA, Hamilton County. Accession # 2198.

Members of a group of three adult birds and eight young discovered (MAB,ELB) at Hastings WMA, Knox County, were well documented.

Long-tailed Jaeger (*Stercorarius longicaudus*)

1. A light phase adult bird was photographed (Class 1-P, CB) and videotaped 16-20 September at the Calamus Fish Hatchery, Garfield County. Accession # 2225.

Black-legged Kittiwake (*Rissa tridactyla*)

A first-winter bird found (DSw) below Gavins Pt. Dam, Cedar County was well documented.

Mew Gull (*Larus canus*)

1. An adult was observed (Class 1-P, NA) 19 January 2019 at Lake McConaughy SRA, Keith County. Accession # 2164.

Additionally, a second-cycle bird discovered (NA) at Branched Oak SRA, Lancaster County was well documented.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Yellow-billed Loon (*Gavia adamsii*)

1. An immature bird was observed (Class 1-P, SK) 08 December 2019 at Branched Oak SRA, Lancaster County. Accession # 2251.

Harris's Hawk (*Parabuteo unicinctus*)

1. To prevent the bird from possibly flying into airplanes at Offutt Air Force Base, Sarpy County, the USDA-APHIS Wildlife Services captured a Harris's Hawk on 14 November 2019. The adult bird was photographed (Class 1-P, MG) and released at a different locale. Accession # 2236.

Red-naped Sapsucker (*Sphyrapicus nuchalis*)

1. An eastward adult male was photographed (Class 1-P, MaW) 10 April 2019 in Bellevue, Sarpy County. Accession # 2176.

Additionally, a female discovered 15 September 2019 at Swanson Reservoir SWMA, Hitchcock County, was well documented.

Vermilion Flycatcher (*Pyrocephalus rubinus*)

Ash-throated Flycatcher (*Myiarchus cinerascens*)

At least two individuals were present along Exit 1, Kimball County, and were documented multiple times from late June through mid-July 2019.

Steller's Jay (*Cyanocitta stelleri*)

A single bird coming to a private feeder since October 2018 in the Wildcat Hills, Scotts Bluff County was well documented.

Mountain Chickadee (Poecile gambeli)

A single bird coming to a private feeder in the Wildcat Hills, Scotts Bluff County, was present from January through March.

Varied Thrush (Ixoreus naevius)

A single adult male present since mid-November 2018 in a yard in Lincoln, Lancaster County continued in 2019.

Bohemian Waxwing (Bombycilla garrulus)

1. A single bird was photographed (Class 1-P, SMI) 14 December 2019 at Lake McConaughy, Keith County. Accession # 2237.
2. A single bird was photographed (Class 1-P, EMB) 24 November 2019 at Wayne, Wayne County. Accession # 2249.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Evening Grosbeak (Coccothraustes vespertinus)

1. Two birds were photographed (Class 1-P, SMI) 12 November 2019 at Wildcat Hills RA, Scotts Bluff County. Accession # 2235.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Pine Grosbeak (Pinicola enucleator)

Two males and a female bird discovered at East Gremlin Outlet Park, Harlan County were well documented.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Black Rosy-Finch (Leucosticte atrata)

1. A single bird was photographed (Class I-P, MW) 01 March 2019 on a cliff face just inside the Wyoming line along Henry Road, Sioux County, but was then observed flying east into Nebraska. Accession # 2170.

White-winged Crossbill (Loxia leucoptera)

1. At least two birds were photographed (Class I-P, EMB) in a mixed group of crossbills 17 September 2019 in Wayne, Wayne County. Accession # 2224.
2. Individuals of a group of up to seven (male and female) birds were photographed (Class 1-P, DW) 27 December 2019 at the Gordon Cemetery, Sheridan County. Accession # 2257.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on the preceding species.

Baird's Sparrow (*Centronyx bairdii*)

1. A recording (Class I-R, DT) was received of a bird calling along Toadstool Road, Sioux County, 17 May 2019. Accession # 2188.
2. A recording (Class I-R, EK) was received of a bird calling near Bowen, Sioux County, 13 June 2019. Accession # 2197.

Virginia's Warbler (*Leiothlypis virginiae*)

1. A description (Class III, SMI) was received of a bird observed 25 August 2019 in East Ash Creek, Dawes County. Accession # 2216.

Connecticut Warbler (*Oporornis agilis*)

1. A written description (Class III, BH) was received of a bird observed 27 May 2019 at Crystal Cove, Dakota County. Accession # 2193.
2. A written description (Class III, MAB/EMB) was received of a bird observed 30 May 2019 at Ponca SP, Dixon County. Accession # 2195.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Cape May Warbler (*Setophaga tigrina*)

1. A male bird was photographed (Class 1-P, SMe) 12 May 2019 in Towl Park, Douglas County. Accession # 2187.
2. A description (Class III, JR) was received of an adult male observed 24 August 2019 at Mercer Woods, Douglas County. Accession # 2215.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Grace's Warbler (*Setophaga graciae*)

1. Nebraska's second record was a bird photographed (Class 1-P, EW) 25 September 2019 at Louisville SRA, Cass County. Accession # 2226.

Painted Bunting (*Passerina ciris*)

1. An adult male was photographed (Class 1-P, AJ) 17 May 2019 near North Bend, Dodge County. Accession # 2189.
2. A female was captured, photographed (Class 1-P, AP), and banded 26 May 2019 at Cedar Point Biological Station, Keith County. Accession # 2192.

NOURC Unaccepted Records:

Records in the following categories are considered unaccepted (NOURC 2010):

IV - probably correct, but not beyond reasonable doubt.

V - a record with insufficient evidence to support the identification claimed.

VI - a probable released or escaped bird or mistaken identification.

Each account of an unaccepted record includes a brief statement noting the species, class, date, location, and reasons for the committee's non-acceptance of the record.

NOURC Unaccepted Records (Received in 2019):Black-bellied Whistling-Duck (*Dendrocygna autumnalis*)

1. A description of eight birds observed 12 May 2019 near Lake Babcock, Platte County lacked detail for approval. Class IV - Accession # 2185.
The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

“Mexican Duck” – Mallard (*Anas platyrhynchos diazi*)

Mexican Duck was considered a separate species for almost a century, but is now treated as a subspecies of the “typical” Mallard because of extensive hybridization along the United States-Mexico border (AOU 1998).

Recent studies have suggested that it deserves full species recognition – see Silcock, W.R., and J.G. Jorgensen. 2020: <https://birds.outdoornebraska.gov/mexican-duck/> for taxonomic discussion and Nebraska status.

Identification of female “Mexican Duck” can be problematic. The following documentations of a possible female “Mexican Duck” were reviewed by outside experts and conclusions were mixed. Following NOURC guidelines, several members felt that these records deserved a rating of Class IV - probably correct, but not beyond reasonable doubt.

1. Photographs/description were received of a female bird seen 14 September 2019 near Madrid, Perkins County. Class IV - Accession # 2220.
2. A description was received of the above bird observed 15 September 2019 near Madrid, Perkins County. Class IV - Accession # 2223.

Mute Swan (*Cygnus olor*)

Several committee members questioned the following record, due to the lack of detailed descriptions and features of the bird relating to possible wild origin.

1. Description (Class VI) of an adult bird 06 August 2019 at Heartland of America Park, Douglas County. Accession # 2209.

King Rail (*Rallus elegans*)

1. A report of a bird heard calling 02 June 2019 near Verdel Landing, Knox County, lacked detail for acceptance. Class V - Accession # 2196.

Arctic Tern (*Sterna paradisaea*)

1. A description of a single bird seen 02 September 2019 at Sutherland Reservoir, Lincoln County, was suggestive of the species but lacked in detail for acceptance. Class V - Accession # 2218.

Red-naped Sapsucker (*Sphyrapicus nuchalis*)

1. A description of a single bird observed 24 March 2019 at Rock Creek SRA, Dundy County was suggestive of the species, but lacked in detail for acceptance. Class IV - Accession # 2173.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

American Three-toed Woodpecker (*Picoides dorsalis*)

1. A description of a single bird observed 30 May 2019 along Milo Road, Sioux County was suggestive of the species, but lacked in detail for acceptance. Class V - Accession # 2194.

Fish Crow (*Corvus ossifragus*)

1. A report of a bird heard calling 17 August 2019 at Cloisters On The Platte, Sarpy County lacked detail for acceptance. Class V - Accession # 2214.

Common Raven (*Corvus corax*)

1. A report of bird heard 12 May 2019 along Monroe Canyon Road, Sioux County, was lacking in detail for acceptance. Class V - Accession # 2186.

Bohemian Waxwing (*Bombycilla garrulus*)

1. A recording taken 09 November 2019 at Wayne, Wayne County, was deemed inconclusive as to species identification. Class V - Accession # 2234.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Evening Grosbeak (*Coccothraustes vespertinus*)

1. A description of two males seen 21 December 2019 at Ponderosa WMA, Dawes County, lacked detail for approval. Class IV - Accession # 2255.

The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on this species.

Black Rosy-Finch (*Leucosticte atrata*)

The species identity of the following photographic records was not in question, but the location where the birds were observed was problematic (inside Wyoming).

NOURC Non-Review List Records (Received in 2019) Filed Without Votes:

The following records are those of species not on the NOURC Review List but which have been accessioned due to other circumstances (out-of range, non-normal date of occurrence, unusual nesting record, etc.). The NOURC no longer seeks documentation on species in these categories. The following records have been filed without NOURC votes.

Lewis's Woodpecker (*Melanerpes lewis*)

1. Photographs (SMI) of a very late individual found 19 November 2019 along Exit 1, Kimball County, were filed. Accession # 2248.
2. Photographs (LD) of an eastward adult first observed 18 December 2019 at Schramm Park SRA, Sarpy County were filed. Many reports of this bird continued on eBird throughout December. Accession # 2254.

White-eyed Vireo (*Vireo griseus*)
