PUBLISHING AWARDS

The *Atlas of the Lewis and Clark Expedition*, edited by Gary E. Moulton, has won the nonfiction category in the 1984 Western Heritage Awards sponsored by the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City. The *Atlas* assembles for the first time a definitive set of maps produced on the Lewis and Clark journey, along with maps executed before and after the expedition. It is the first in a projected eleven-volume edition of the *Journals of the Lewis and Clark Expedition*, all to be edited by Moulton with the assistance of Thomas W. Dunlay. The project is sponsored by the Center for Great Plains Studies and the American Philosophical Society, and published by the University of Nebraska Press with a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Books sponsored by the Center have also recently won several design awards. The *Atlas of the Lewis and Clark Expedition* was chosen in the Picture Book category by the American Association of University Presses and was cited for excellent craftsmanship in bookmaking and publishing by the Chicago Book Clinic. Willa Cather's *The Troll Garden*, in a variorum edition prepared by James Woodress and published for the Center for Great Plains Studies, was honored for its jacket by the American Association of University Presses and for bookmaking excellence by the Chicago Book Clinic.
