"UNRA members and team members have been working exceptionally hard to make arrangements for the rodeo," Sue Voss, club adviser, said. "We are very excited about the change in venue to Lincoln and hope we will draw a large crowd from Lincoln, the university, and surrounding communities."

Traditionally the UNRA annual rodeo has been at the Saunders County 4-H Grounds in Wahoo, Neb. To accommodate the large crowds, the association has decided to move its event to the Lancaster Event Center on the east side of Lincoln.

The 49th Annual UNL Rodeo Club rodeo will be April 20-22, 2007. Each night features special events.

- Friday, April 20, 7 p.m. – Recognition of UNL alumni, rodeo dance following.

- Saturday, April 21, 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. – "Tough Enough to Wear Pink": is the Saturday night event to promote breast cancer research and awareness. \$2 from each ticket will be donated to the program.
- Sunday, April 22, 2 p.m.

The UNL Rodeo Association is a member of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA), which was founded in 1948. The NIRA has grown to include more than 3,500 students and 137 schools and universities. The NIRA has 11 divisions that host more than 100 rodeos each year. The University of Nebraska-Lincoln men's team is ranked sixth in overall standings in the Great Plains region and the women's team is not far behind with a ninth place standing.

CASNRAA Football Reunion Builds Friendships, Funds Scholarships

Gilbert recently accepted a position with the Nebraska Army National Guard (NEARNG) in Lincoln, Neb., that more fully utilizes her Environmental Studies degree. The Army National Guard Environmental Program controls resources in agreement with federal, state, and local laws, as well as maintaining environmental control.

Gilbert's job as an Environmental Assistant Coordinator primarily focuses on hazardous waste management. Along with these management responsibilities, Gilbert also gains perspective in anything and everything pertaining to environmental compliance. She has worked on activities such as storage tank programs, storm water programs, and hazardous

material programs.

Working for the Nebraska Army National Guard on environmental issues certainly puts a different perspective on her career.

"What's interesting about working for the Nebraska Army National Guard is getting the opportunity to work with the military and the people," Gilbert added. "While we are maintaining the Guard as being mission-ready, we are also sustaining the environment."

NEARNG is a perfect link between Gilbert's career goals of working for both the government and the environment. She also is delighted to assist in training opportunities on the job and take advantage of many traveling opportunities that have taken her to places such as Orlando, San Diego, and even the Virgin Islands.

Although Gilbert always has known the type of career she wanted to pursue in life, she was never truly certain of what direction she was headed.

"I always thought I would move

out of state at the time of graduation and explore something else besides Nebraska," she said. "But that didn't happen."

Gilbert believes sometimes the best things find you when you are not looking for them. There are jobs out there that nobody would think were available. She did not know the Nebraska Army National Guard job existed until a few years ago. She also believes that putting your resume on the internet and networking are crucial for job opportunities.

According to Gilbert, staying involved, even after you graduate from college, is important. Her experiences at the university not only gave her educational insight, but also experiences that she can use in her everyday life. These experiences gained while working with the environment take the world one step closer to the dreams of an environmentalist.

"Working with the environment is simply knowing that you are 'helping' to protect the environment on a daily basis," Gilbert said. —Lindsey Horner
