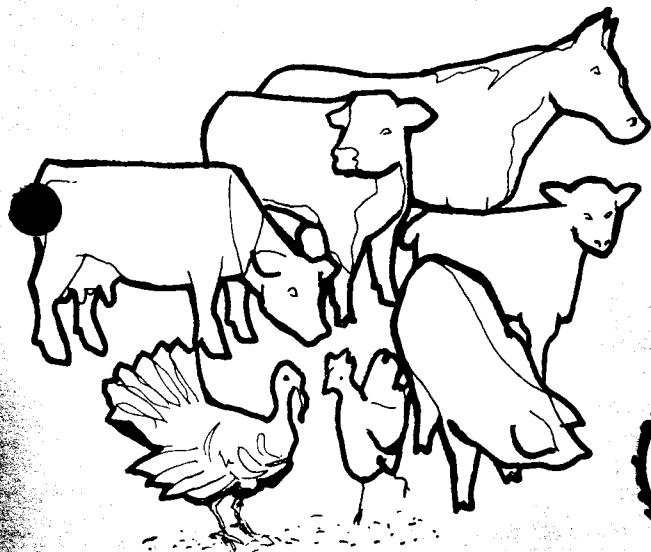

ANIMAL SCIENCE COMPLEX RECEIVES LEGISLATIVE FUNDING

In March, 1984, the Nebraska Legislature appropriated and Governor Kerrey approved funding for construction associated with the completion of the Animal Science Complex. The need for new and modern animal science teaching facilities and updated research capabilities on the UNL campus will be met as a result of this action. The plans and dreams of the Department developed over the last 10 years will become reality.

New facilities provided in this project include: 1) A livestock teaching center including an arena, 2) livestock evaluation and practicums laboratories, 3) livestock housing facilities, and 4) classroom, laboratory and office additions to Marvel Baker Hall. The classroom facility will have general classrooms for use in the College of Agriculture and the Animal Science Department. Some specialized classrooms and laboratories for Animal Science teaching will be included. Research laboratories for animal physiology, ruminant and monogastric nutrition and meat science will be included in the complex.

An addition to Loeffel Meat Laboratory will include: 1) pilot laboratories for meat cutting, processing, manufacturing, cooking and packaging of meat products, 2) poultry slaughtering facilities, and 3) specialized classrooms for meat demonstration and carcass evaluation classes.

Some renovation of Marvel Baker Hall, particularly in the intensive animal facilities and research laboratories, will be included in the project.

We express sincere appreciation to all segments of the Nebraska animal industry for the support needed to obtain approval of the project. The members of the Ag-40

Committee chaired by Mr. John Klosterman of David City, deserves special recognition for their long and diligent work to identify and communicate the need for new Animal Science facilities at UN-L. Completion of the Animal Science Complex will provide Nebraska with one of the most modern and complete animal science teaching and research facilities in the United States.

Total appropriation for planning, construction and equipment is \$19,161,750. The design development phase of planning will be complete in July and construction documents will be finished in December, 1984. We anticipate that construction will start in February, 1985 and the facility will be ready for use in April or May, 1987.

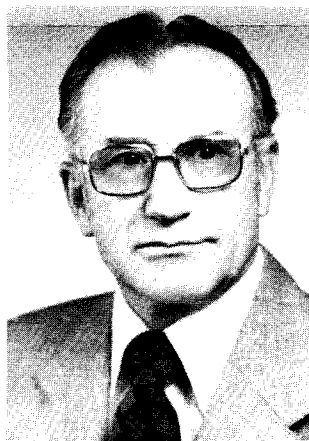

DR. CHARLES ADAMS RETIRES

Dr. Charles H. Adams officially became Professor Emeritus of UNL December 31, 1983. "Charlie" as he is widely known by his many friends, joined the Animal Science staff in 1947 as the only instructor in Meats. He also coached the Meats Judging Team for many years. Adams probably is known by more former students and graduates in Animal Science than any other staff member in the College of Agriculture. In 1972 he was appointed Assistant Dean of the College of Agriculture where he advised and assisted most of the students in the college. He has received many awards for teaching from national and UNL organizations.

Just before his retirement Adams was the recipient of the L. K. Crowe award for Outstanding Undergraduate Student Advisor from the College of Agriculture. This honor recognized the many years of exceptional undergraduate advising he provided students at UNL. The award is named for the late Professor L. K. Crowe long time member of the Animal Science (Dairy) staff.

Following several national and international trips with his wife Eula Mae, Adams will be associated with the University of Nebraska Alumni Association. He will

also have an office in Marvel Baker Hall.

VINCENT H. ARTHAUD MEMORIAL FUND

Mrs. Catherine Arthaud has established the Vincent H. Arthaud Memorial Fund to commemorate the life and distinguished career of her husband. Vince received his Bachelor's degree in 1936 and his Master's degree in 1953, both from the University of Nebraska. He served as *Professor of Animal Science* from 1945-1977. The fund is established in the University of Nebraska Foundation and income will support travel fellowships for Animal Science graduate students. The fellowships will be used toward expenses incurred by graduate students in presentation of research papers at scientific meetings.

During his career in the Animal Science Department, Vince served as research farm manager, teacher, judging team coach, researcher and business manager. He was responsible for management and supervision of the Department's beef cattle herds. Much of the early research on feeding young bulls for slaughter was reported by Vince.

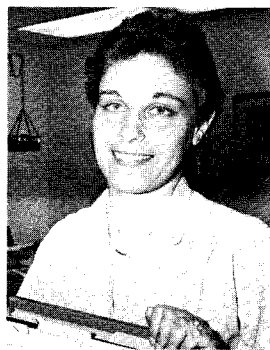

WARREN RECEIVES TEACHING AWARD

Professor R. B. Warren long time Livestock Judging team coach and Animal Science teacher received the Distinguished Teaching Award in the College of Agriculture at the May 13, 1984 Honors Convocation. R.B., as he is familiarly known to hundreds of former students and alumni, was recognized for his service and dedication to undergraduate student teaching. A leader in 4-H horse activities, R.B. was honored at the 1983 State 4-H Horse show by the establishment of a \$10,000 scholarship fund in his name. The scholarship will be available to outstanding 4-H horse club members. Warren joined the UNL Animal Science staff in 1956. He received the Livestock Service Award for 1984, presented by Walnut Grove Feed Company.

DICKERSON RECEIVES SUPERIOR SERVICE AWARD FROM USDA

Dr. Gordon E. Dickerson who holds a joint appointment in the Animal Science Department at UNL and the Roman L. Hruska U.S. Meat Animal Research Center of USDA was recently awarded the Superior Service Award by the United States Department of Agriculture. The presentation was made during the award ceremonies at the Department of Agriculture in Washington, D.C. June 1984. The award recognizes the contributions of Dickerson in the fields of Genetics and Animal Breeding.

Before joining the faculty at UNL, Dickerson was with the Department of Agriculture in Canada. He was the Poultry Geneticist for Kimber Poultry Farms, Fremont, California for twenty years.

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that Livestock Judging was first introduced into the Animal Husbandry (Science) curriculum in the late eighteen-hundreds at the University of Wisconsin? Professor John A. Craig, Chairman of the Animal Husbandry department at the University of Wisconsin made this course a leading feature of the Animal Husbandry curriculum. In 1901 Professor Craig wrote a book entitled, "Judging Livestock". The book remained the leading textbook in this subject area for many years.

In 1900 the first International Livestock Exposition, with exhibitions from Canada and the U.S. was held at Chicago, IL. The first International Collegiate Livestock Judging contest was a part of this exhibition. This event soon became the "SUPERBOWL" of Collegiate Livestock Judging activities. Teams from the University of Nebraska have participated in this event since 1908. On two occasions Nebraska teams have won this intercollegiate event.

In 1926, a Meats Judging contest was initiated at the Chicago show. Teams from Nebraska have won the contest eight times.
