## WHAT/WHO IS MRRIC?

The Missouri River Recovery Implementation Committee (MRRIC) will serve as a collaborative forum to develop a shared vision and comprehensive plan for the restoration of the Missouri River ecosystem. This committee will provide recommendations to federal, tribal, state, local and private entities in the basin on efforts to recover threatened and endangered species and restore their habitats while sustaining the river's many uses. Section 5018 of the Water Resources Development Act of 2007 authorizes the Secretary of the Army to establish the MRRIC.

By involving stakeholders who represent a wide range of interests, the MRRIC will ensure that stakeholder and public values are considered and incorporated into ecosystem restoration plans. In addition to providing guidance on the existing recovery and mitigation program, the MRRIC will be a key forum for shaping the Missouri River Ecosystem Restoration Plan. The study leading up to the Plan is authorized in Section 5018 of the Water Resources Development Act of 2007 and will be developed in consultation with the MRRIC.

While the federal agencies will not participate in decisions regarding the recommendations of the MRRIC, the federal agencies will support and inform the MRRIC.

A Federal Working Group (FWG) of agency representatives has been appointed by the federal executives of the Missouri River Basin Interagency Roundtable. These agencies have responsibilities for management of resources or other functions on the Missouri River and will advise the MRRIC as the committee considers recommendations.

A broad, unified, inclusive, transparent basin-wide approach is necessary to successfully recover the protected Missouri River species and the ecosystem on which they depend.

## MRRIC CHARTER APPROVED

On July 1, 2008, Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works, the Honorable John Paul Woodley, Jr., approved the Charter for the MRRIC. Approval of the MRRIC Charter was the culmination of over a year of intense work by the MRRIC Planning Group. The Planning Group was comprised of representatives of Missouri River basin Tribes and states and a wide range of stakeholder interests that were asked by the Corps and other federal agencies to develop a Recommended Charter for the MRRIC.

Membership of the MRRIC is comprised of representatives of federal agencies, Tribes, states and stakeholders from throughout the Missouri River basin. Each federal agency head, tribal chairman and state governor may appoint one representative to the MRRIC. Stakeholder representatives apply for membership by identifying their interest in one of the 16 interest categories. The MRRIC was established in 2008 and meets a minimum of twice a year.
