The stream of the Ohio is in every
 part Moderate, except the Rapids.



Here is an extensive Tract, call'd Green River
 Plains, which produces no Timber, and but
 little Water, mostly Fertile, and cover'd with
 excellent Grass and Herbage.

Here the Ohio runs a rapid course
 the Green River which falls into it
 200 Miles below the Rapids
