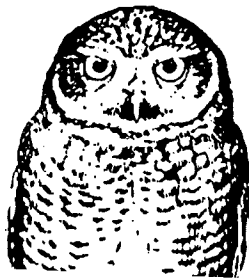

Note: Only pertinent items will be included here, but the complete minutes are obtainable from Todd or from Rosalind Morris, Editor.

Executive Board Meeting, Kearney, NE, 2/29/92. 7 members present.

Tom Labedz, Librarian, said that a new slide projector had been purchased and is owned by NOU.

Moving of the NOU library, including archives, from its current location in Nebraska Hall, UN-L was discussed. Moved by Gary Lingle, seconded by Alice Kenitz, and passed unanimously that we investigate the possibility of depositing the archives in the Nebraska State Historical Society, which is willing to accept them.

Records Committee. Alan Grenon moved out of Nebraska and resigned as Chairman.

Moved by Gary Lingle, seconded by Scott Purdy, that members vote by mail to amend the Bylaws, Article VIII, Section 2, from: At any meeting of the corporation, 1/6 of the members shall constitute a quorum, to: At any business meeting of the corporation, the members present at the meeting shall constitute a quorum. Motion passed with one abstention.

Executive Board Meeting, McCook, NE, 5/16/92. 5 members present.

A new NOU brochure has been completed under the direction of Jon Farrar, and 1000 copies have been printed.

Two motions were made by Alice Kenitz, seconded by Rosalind Morris: 1) that CD #11640 at Gering State Bank be closed at maturity on June 19, 1992, and the funds, plus \$400 from the Life Membership dues collected since 1991, be transferred to an FDIC institution of the Treasurer's choice, the account to be treated as an endowment fund; 2) that CD #6993 be cashed and the funds transferred to an FDIC institution of the Treasurer's choice. Both motions passed unanimously.

91st Annual Business Meeting, McCook, NE, 5/16/92.

Motion by Alice Kenitz, seconded by Ross Silcock, that a ceiling of \$1000 per issue of the 1992 volume of The Nebraska Bird Review be approved. Motion passed.

Motion by Roger Sharpe, seconded by Ross Silcock, that \$600 be allowed for the Newsletters for 1992. Motion passed.

Motion by Roger Sharpe, seconded by Ross Silcock, that \$2500 per called meeting be allowed. Motion passed.

Motion by Roger Sharpe, seconded by Alice Rushton, that the next president appoint a committee of 5, including at least one member of the Board of Directors, to review the current Articles of Incorporation, and any and all suggested changes. Motion passed.

Motion by Roger Sharpe, seconded by Alice Rushton, that the same committee appointed to review the Articles of Incorporation, also review current and past Bylaws, and develop new Bylaws to reflect changes in the Articles of Incorporation and other suggested changes. Motion passed.

91st Annual Business Meeting (continued)

Motion by Roger Sharpe, seconded by Ross Silcock, that a Publication Committee, composed of three members, be appointed by the new Board of Directors to work with the Editor and develop publication policy,. Motion passed.

Motion by Roger Sharpe, seconded by Shirley Morris, that a Library Committee, composed of three members, be appointed by the new Board of Directors to assist the Librarian and develop library management policy. Motion passed.

Officers were elected for the 1992-93 year. The president and treasurer were elected by secret ballot because of two candidates for each office, one on the slate presented by Everett Gross, and the other by a nomination from the floor. The other officers were elected from the slate. The officers elected are as follows: President, George Brown; Vice President, Scott Purdy; Secretary, Todd Jensen; Treasurer, Colleen Babcock; Review Editor, Rosalind Morris; and Librarian, Thomas Labeledz.

Executive Board Meeting, Ft. Robinson, 9/19/92. 5 members present.

Thomas Labeledz is resigning as Librarian at the end of his current term (May, 1993). Other items will be in the Newsletter.

SPRING 1992 OCCURRENCE REPORT

During the reporting period from January 1 through June 30, 1992, 305 species were observed in Nebraska. The reports came from 56 counties, and ranged from one-date observations to the six-month range. For comparison, there were 301 species recorded in 1991 with reports from 34 counties. The number of counties was increased significantly in 1992, particularly in the western part of Nebraska.

Records covering the six-month period, or several dates over a shorter span of time, are presented in Table 1. The same species are listed on facing pages (except for page 136) for two groups of counties, which are arranged from west to east and north to south. The left page starts with the northwest region, and the right page ends with the southeast region. Shaded cells involve species requiring documentation by the NOU Records Committee, but for which none was provided.

A section following Table 1 gives documentation on rare species, or those observed outside the usual range or season. Other sections include more limited county reports than are included in the table, and a list of reporters and observers, as well as the number of species observed in each county.

SIGHTING DOCUMENTATION FOR SPRING 1992 OCCURRENCE REPORT

This section includes those species listed by the Records Committee as needing documentation. If none was provided, the cell within the table is shaded. Reporters who have such species in their lists are encouraged to submit documentation to the NOU Records Committee (Joe Gubanyi, 210 Hillcrest, Seward, NE 68434) if they have not already done so. This section also includes reports of species that were significantly out-of-range or out-of-season.

Species Needing Documentation

* **Clark's Grebe:** Richard Rosche observed one bird among 15-20 Western Grebes at the west end of Lake McConaughy, Keith County (a fourth record for this region) on June 4, 1992. He distinguished the single Clark's Grebe from the Western Grebes by its much lighter sides. "Closer examination revealed an orangish-yellow bill and a reddish eye surrounded by white (the black of the cap did not come down so as to include the eye region as in the Western Grebe)."

* **Eurasian Wigeon:** This species was documented for two counties.

Robin Harding and Lanny Randolph observed one bird among some American Wigeons in Gleason WPA, Kearney County on April 4, 1992. It was about the same size as the American Wigeons, with the same type of bill and similar wings. It differed in having a reddish head with a yellowish forehead, grayish sides, and a rosier breast.

Richard and Dorothy Rosche observed an adult male Eurasian Wigeon in the eastern Oglala National Grasslands, Dawes County on April 25, 1992. It was on a small roadside pond with about 50 American Wigeons and several dozen other dabbling ducks. They identified it at close range by its gray back and sides compared to the brown American Wigeons. They noted that it had an obvious brownish-red head with a yellowish forehead patch, and the breast was very pinkish in front at the waterline. They felt that this adult-plumaged bird could not be confused with any other species under the circumstances and conditions of their observation.

* **Oldsquaw:** Richard Rosche observed a female bird in the Kingsley Dam Spillway, Keith County on April 17 and 20, 1992. He indicated that this was about the 21st known record for the Lake McConaughy region. He had previously observed females in the Platte River System in 1987 and 1989. He wrote: "The Oldsquaw almost always frequents deep water, often among ice floes, particularly at Lake Ogallala and at the base of the Kingsley Dam in the spillway, where it seems to often appear in conjunction with the coldest and most severe winter conditions."

* **Barrow's Goldeneye:** Richard and Dorothy Rosche observed a well-marked male on Winter's Creek Lake, North Platte National Wildlife Refuge, Scotts Bluff County on March 14, 1992. Richard provided the following description: "It was accompanied by a probable female of this species. The male was obvious by its elongated, light-colored, crescent-shaped patch on the sides of the rather puffy, rounded head. The back was very dark, and the row of squarish-shaped spots

on the scapulars was obvious. The possible female possessed only a yellow-tipped bill. I presumed it was a female Barrow's only on the basis of its rather rounded, puffy head shape (as opposed to the nearby female Common Goldeneyes) and by its attentiveness to the male Barrow's. There are several records from this refuge during the winter months, mostly from the late 1970's when Fred Zeillemaker was Refuge Manager."

*** Gyrfalcon:** Dorothy Rosche observed one dark-phased bird perched on a roadside fence post near Hays Springs, Sheridan County on January 16, 1992. She described it as a large, grayish-black falcon with a heavily streaked breast. "It was larger than either the Prairie or Peregrine [Falcon], which we regularly see. It was rather tame and had to be flushed. When it flew, it had the characteristic falcon flight - very rapid, very shallow wing beats and characteristic falcon shape with pointed wings and a long, narrow tail. It had no obvious facial markings as seen in the Peregrine or Prairie Falcon."

*** Mountain Plover:** Richard Rosche observed four birds in a large prairie-dog town west of Bushnell, Kimball County on April 27, 1992. "This site was not too many miles from the last known nesting site in Kimball County north and west of Bushnell. These were brown-backed plovers with whitish underparts [and] no bands of any kind on the breast. The typical plover head and face pattern was obvious."

*** Black-necked Stilt:** Richard Rosche observed four adults in the usual Lane Lake area nesting site between Antioch and Lakeside, Sheridan County on May 8, 1992. To his knowledge, the birds did not remain there to nest.

*** Whimbrel:** Richard Rosche observed a single bird on the sandy south shore of Enders Reservoir, Chase County on May 2, 1992. He wrote: "It was associated with a large group of migrant shorebirds - 45 [American] Avocets, 35 Willets, 12 Marbled Godwits, and 21 Long-billed Dowitchers. [The Whimbrel] was a rather small, grayish curlew, totally unlike the larger, cinnamon-colored Long-billed [Curlew]. Its head was obviously dark- and light-striped, and there was a dark stripe through the eye. This was my third spring-migration record for Western Nebraska since 1969."

*** Laughing Gull:** Robin Harding and Lanny Randolph saw one bird near the Overton bridge in Phelps County on April 19, 1992. They wrote: "The top side of the wings was all dark gray. It had no black and white on the wing-tips."

*** California Gull:** Richard and Dorothy Rosche observed three adults at Sutherland Reservoir, Lincoln County on February 15, and one adult at the east end of Lake McConaughy, Keith County on February 16, 1992. They wrote: "These were undoubtedly wintering individuals, for the winter of 1991-1992 was the first time the species has attempted to winter in [Nebraska]. All of the birds were larger and had darker underparts than the accompanying Ring-billed Gulls. The legs were greenish-yellow, and the bills were

yellow [with] a reddish spot near the tip of the lower mandible. All were seen perched on the beaches."

*** Iceland Gull:** Loren and Babs Padelford saw one bird at Branched Oak Lake, Lancaster County on January 11, 1992. It was sitting on an ice shelf at the northeast corner of the lake with about 50 Herring Gulls and 150 Ring-billed Gulls. They described the bird as follows: "An overall tan-colored gull, heavier-bodied, longer, and taller than Ring-billed Gull, and smaller than Herring Gull. The head was rounder than [that of] the Herring Gulls. The head and neck were a cream color, [and] the rest of the bird was a uniform light-tannish color. It was considerably lighter than the Herring Gulls. At the closest viewing point while the bird was sitting on the ice with wings folded, a checkered pattern in a darker tan color was noticeable on the wings. The primary feathers were all light at rest and while the bird was flying. On one occasion when viewing it from the closest point, we could see two very pale-gray chevrons at the tips of the 1st and 2nd primaries. The primaries and secondaries were near-white, while the upper wing coverts were a darker cream to tan color. There was no secondary bar. The tail also appeared to be a light tan. However, on one occasion we were able to see a gray tail band of at least an inch in width, [but] it was so pale that it was difficult to see. At rest, the wings extended well beyond the tail by more than a bill length. The eye was dark. The bill was entirely black, longer and more stout than [that of] the Ring-billed, and slimmer and shorter than [that of] the Herring Gull. Legs were a pale pink. The plumage coloration and all-dark bill suggest that the bird was in first basic plumage."

*** Lesser Black-backed Gull:** Babs and Loren Padelford, and Neal Ratzlaff observed one bird from 200 to 300 yards at Pawnee Lake, Lancaster County on February 26, 1992, along with Ring-billed Gulls and Herring Gulls. Their description of the bird follows: "The overall size was a little larger than Ring-billed Gulls, and quite noticeably smaller than Herring Gulls. The neck appeared to be quite a bit heavier and longer than [that of] the Ring-billed, and the bill was much larger than [that of] the Ring-billed. The mantle and back were charcoal gray, much darker than [those of] either the Ring-billed or Herring [Gull]. There were white tips on the first two or three primaries, and a white trailing edge on the wings. Underneath the wings, the primaries were dark, and the remainder was white. Tail was all white. The head was smudgy gray on the top above the eye. The bill was large, more the size of the Herring Gull, [and] all yellow with a dark spot on the side, [but] we could not see the color of the spot. The legs were yellow."

*** Glaucous Gull:** Richard and Dorothy Rosche observed a first- or second-year bird at Sutherland Reservoir, Lincoln County on February 15, and another bird at the east end of Lake McConaughy, Keith County on February 16, 1992. They wrote: "Both birds were larger and bulkier in size than the accompanying Ring-billed and Herring Gulls. The black-tipped bill was obvious, as was the complete lack of any black or gray on the wing tips. The legs were pinkish. The Sutherland Reservoir bird was very creamy in

coloration throughout, whereas the Lake McConaughy bird was much whiter. Both birds were seen in flight and while perched on the beaches."

*** Canyon Wren:** Tanya Bray, Babs Padelford, and Mark Brogie observed one adult male at Walker's Valley View, Mark and Mary Streets, Knox County on June 9, 1992. Tanya gave the following description: "Grayish-brown crown; white throat, lower cheek, and upper breast; thin, straight bill; rufous back, wings, and tail; cinnamon belly; size about that of a Carolina Wren. The song was slurred notes going down the scale, ending at times with two burry, harsh notes. It sang repeatedly from the roof of a house, and stopped to investigate a roof vent." It was recorded by Babs Padelford, and photographed by Mark Brogie.

*** Cassin's Sparrow:** Richard Rosche provided the following documentation: "a) Five singing males were seen and heard in sand-sage habitat west of Kilpatrick Lake, Box Butte County on May 29, 1992 by Richard and Dorothy Rosche. This is the third consecutive year for this species in this locality. b) A single singing male was seen and heard by Richard Rosche in sand-sage habitat on the east side of Rt. 61 in Chase County near the Perkins County line at T8N R38W S15 NW 1/4 on June 2, 1992. c) A single singing male was heard and seen in sand-sage habitat in Perkins County on the west side of Rt. 61, 1/4 mile south of Mile Marker 57, by Richard Rosche on June 2, 1992. All of these singing males were performing their characteristic flight songs from roadside fence posts or nearby bushes. I am very familiar with the species from numerous southwestern birding trips, and from adjacent regions in northeastern Colorado."

Species Out-of-Range or Out-of-Season

*** American White Pelican:** Richard Rosche saw two birds at Sutherland Reservoir, Lincoln County on February 15, 1992, and was told by local workmen that the birds had been there all winter. He thinks this is the first successful wintering of the species in Nebraska. He reported some very early migrants on February 29: 35 birds at Harlan County Reservoir, Harlan County, and one bird on the Platte River south of Kearney, Buffalo County. He attributed this early migration to the unusually early spring season.

*** Double-crested Cormorant:** A single bird was observed at Sutherland Reservoir, Lincoln County on February 15 by Richard and Dorothy Rosche, and on February 27, 1992 by Richard Rosche. It was a wintering bird and had been seen with the American White Pelicans by local workmen all winter. The Rosches consider this to be one of the first successful wintering records for Nebraska.

*** Long-billed Dowitcher:** Richard and Dorothy Rosche saw one bird near Lakeside, Sheridan County on June 13, 1992. Richard wrote: "This is the LATEST spring-migration straggler that I am aware of for Western Nebraska."

* **Red-necked Phalarope:** Richard and Dorothy Rosche observed two birds near Lakeside, Sheridan County on the "VERY LATE date" of June 13, 1992. Richard is not aware of any other June records for Western Nebraska from past years.

* **Least Tern:** Two birds were seen by Richard Rosche near Ash Hollow on the North Platte River, Garden County on June 4, 1992, the farthest west he has observed this species in the North Platte Valley.

* **Eastern Wood-Pewee:** Richard Rosche wrote: "An individual sang repeatedly for 45 minutes from dense cottonwood forest on the southwestern shore of Lake McConaughy, Keith County on June 4, 1992. This was only the second known record for the Lake McConaughy region, and one of only a few [records] in Western Nebraska in my experience. Its loud, clear whistled 'pee-a-wee' song was unmistakable."

* **Palm Warbler:** A single bird was observed at Smith Lake, Sheridan County on May 8, 1992 by Richard Rosche, in his experience only the fourth spring record this far west in Nebraska since 1969. He described it as "a brownish, tail-wagging warbler. There was a reddish cap present as well as a lightly yellowish-washed breast with bright yellow under-tail coverts."

* **Summer Tanager:** Richard Rosche observed a single, blotchy-plumaged singing male in a large cottonwood on the edge of Smith Lake, Sheridan County on May 8, 1992. He wrote: "The bird remained singing in the same tree for at least 45-50 minutes. I recognized the robin-like song immediately upon first hearing it. It was a patchy greenish-reddish-yellowish bird all over. The large bill was yellowish, particularly on the lower mandible. This is only the second record for Northwestern Nebraska of which I am aware."

AN ADDITIONAL NEBRASKA RECORD OF COMMON EIDER?

An "Iowa" record of Common Eider to date has apparently not been considered as a Nebraska record (Johnsgard 1980, Bray et al. 1986). A note was published by Philip Dumont in 1934 (Wilson Bulletin 46: 203), describing a bird that was shot by a hunter on the Missouri River below Sioux City, Iowa on November 1, 1901. Dumont cited measurements that established the specimen as an example of *Somateria mollissima v-nigra*, the western race of Common Eider. Dumont wrote that "this record might be claimed as Nebraskan as well as Iowan", a statement noted by Tate (1969) on the only other record of Common Eider for Nebraska (Bray et al. 1986).

From the information available, there is no evidence as to which state the Sioux City Common Eider was in when it was collected. It seems to have been claimed as an Iowa record because Dumont was an Iowan, and the specimen was recovered from a Sioux City market, rather than because of any data ascertaining the provenance of the specimen. It is well-known that the Iowa-Nebraska boundary is tortuous, and in many places unrelated to the current channel of the Missouri River.

I suggest that this record be considered as part of the Nebraska avifauna. This case is somewhat analogous to several records from the DeSoto National Wildlife Refuge such as Bean Goose, Brant, and Barrow's Goldeneye, all of which have been accepted for both states because they have been observed on a body of water containing the state boundary. (In these three cases, it should be noted that these birds were adjudged to have crossed the

invisible boundary while in view, and thus validated for each state.) I repeat that there is no more evidence that this record belongs to Iowa than to Nebraska, so I believe that it should be considered a "joint" record for both states.
