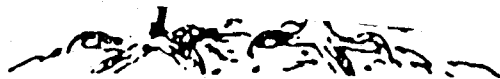
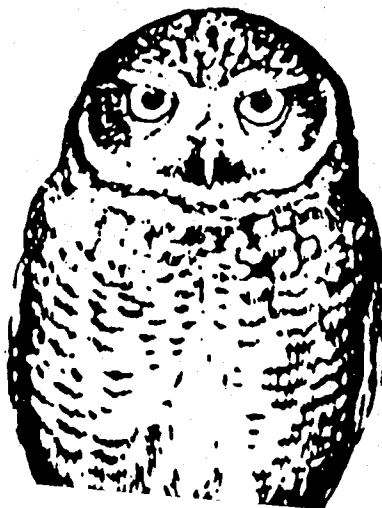

WHOOPIING CRANE SIGHTINGS DURING FALL MIGRATION, 1993

During the summer of 1993, an all-time record of 45 whooping-crane nests were confirmed on the breeding grounds at Wood Buffalo National Park. Suspected mortality included two nesting females. A total of 143 whooping cranes (127 adult/subadult and 16 young) arrived at Aransas between October 20 and November 22. As of December 30, five juveniles were missing and presumed dead. The only verified mortality during migration was a crane near Midland, Texas which died November 5 after apparently flying into a fence. The first dates for confirmed observations of migrating whooping cranes were August 16 in Saskatchewan, Canada, and September 17 in North Dakota; the last sighting date was November 1 in Texas. Sightings were reported from Saskatchewan (28), Montana (1), North Dakota (3), South Dakota (4), Nebraska (8), Kansas (8), Oklahoma (5), and Texas (1).

PINE SISKINS IN BREEDING CONDITION ALONG THE NORTH PLATTE RIVER,
KEITH COUNTY, NEBRASKA, 1993

Johnsgard (1979) categorizes the Pine Siskin (*Carduelis pinus*) as an erratic breeder in a number of eastern and southeastern Nebraska counties. Ducey (1988) considers this species to be a regular nester throughout the state in suitable coniferous habitat. Neither authors have listed breeding records in Keith County, although Ducey cites a record from Chase County (Bennett 1986). The Pine Siskin is known as a breeder in 12 counties in Kansas (Thompson and Ely 1992).

Methods

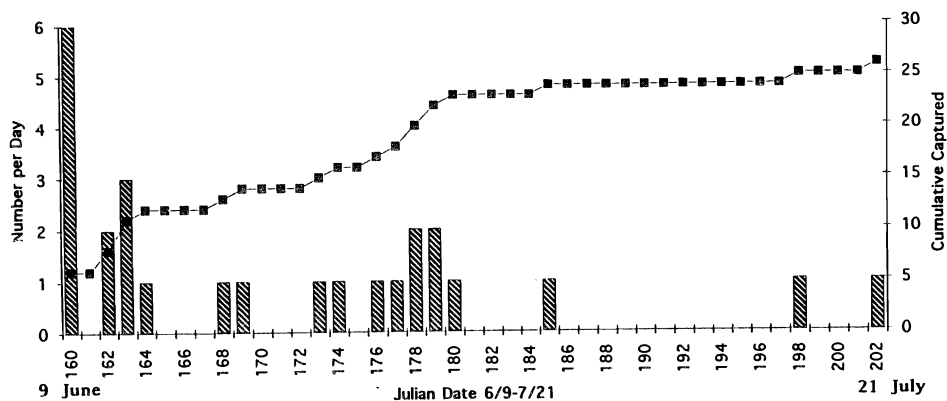
We caught and banded Pine Siskins at Cedar Point Biological Station near Lake Keystone, Keith County, Nebraska (41° 13' N, 101° 38' W) during June and July, 1993. All individuals were caught in standard 36mm mesh mist nets, 12 meters long, near feeders containing niger thistle seeds. The nets were set on the hillsides of steep canyons 25-35 meters above the level of the lake among an interrupted stand of mixed eastern and western cedars (*Juniperus virginiana* and *J. scopulorum*), which were interspersed with warm-season grasses and bare rock outcrops on the Ogallala Sandstone formation.

Results

Twenty Pine Siskins were first-captured birds and six were captured a second time, for an accumulation of 26 records for the species (Figure 1). Thirteen of the 20 first-captured birds were females with obvious

brood patches, five were males with cloacal protuberances, and two, captured on 17 and 21 July, were hatching-year birds classified as sex unknown. The period during which the Pine Siskins were caught was 9 June through 21 July. The beginning date agrees with the records of nesting phenology described for Kansas (Thompson and Ely 1992). A few individuals lingered far beyond the 15 June nest departure date reported for Kansas.

Our records show the presence of Pine Siskins over a 43-day period, which coincides with its nesting period. This, coupled with the capture of hatchlings on 17 and 21 July, strongly suggests that this species may have bred at Cedar Point in 1993. We expect to continue this study in subsequent years to establish the possibility of regular nesting by Pine Siskins in these canyonlands. We speculate that the presence of the cedar trees is the habitat variable that attracts them to this area.

NEBRASKA CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT FOR 1993

The 1993 Nebraska Christmas Bird Counts are shown in the table in a west (left) to east (right) order, but the narrative accounts are in alphabetical order. In the table those numbers which were underlined (to emphasize the unusual number) in the reports are shown in **bold**, and the species for which the names were underlined (to emphasize that the species was unusual) in the report are marked *

before the number in the particular column. For both Eagles the total number (given first) is broken down by age immediately afterwards, and these numbers are shown in *italics* to indicate that, to avoid duplication, those numbers should not be included in adding the total individuals. Other species, such as Snow Goose, Flicker, and Junco, have more than one line, but in those cases the figures are independent of each other. "Species" entries, such as for hawks or gulls, were not included in the number of species reported, except that "meadowlark sp." was used if there was no specific form reported. Species seen in the count circle during count week, but not seen on count day, are marked H.

Mr. Giblin commented: This was our worst production relative to effort in many years. Lincoln received nearly three feet (!) of rain this summer. In July there was a stretch of 10 consecutive nights of heavy storming. Later that same month there was a run of 6 nights of even heavier storming. During this period, Lincoln received its strongest windstorm in decades, winds exceeding 100 mph, which did great damage to the city trees. As a consequence, there was poor nesting success, particularly for ground-nesting birds. In addition, the plants that provide the winter wild-food crop did not set seed because of the extremely wet conditions, so the wild-food crop is the worst I have seen in the 20+ years I have been involved with the Lincoln CBC. A further problem is that the low, sheltered areas along streams, ravines, and draws were heavily flooded this fall (again!) and appear to have been swept clean. To further cut wintering bird populations, there was an early and cold, wet fall, in fact, the third coldest on record, with the earliest hard freeze ever recorded here. Around Thanksgiving time winter hit with snow and cold to finish driving out most birds. However, the lakes did not completely freeze over during this time, and have thawed out since. Some habitat within the city, such as the University campuses, which have many environmental plantings, hold species throughout the winter that are rare in the countryside. Such are the White-throated Sparrows, which are common at the University and nowhere else. The Field Sparrow also falls in this category.

The Western Meadowlarks were identified on the basis of songs. All non-singing meadowlarks were reported as meadowlark sp.
